NATURE OF LLB PROGRAMMES

Full Time (3 Year) LLB

- The full time LL.B. is the traditional programme offered by the Faculty of Law. It is distinct from the Part Time programme, which is fee paying programme, on a per credit basis. Full time students cannot register in some Part Time classes.
- Courses taken in first and second year are compulsory. In third year you will be able to take optional courses, including (with express permission of the Dean) out of Faculty courses.

Direct Entry (2 Year) LLB

 The Direct Entry (DE) programme is a 2 year, accelerated LL.B. To be eligible, you must have a good previous degree and have completed or be exempted from all Foundation courses. First year DE courses are compulsory. Second year combines compulsory and optional courses.

NATURE OF LLB PROGRAMMES

Part Time (5 Year) LLB

- The Part-Time LLB is currently in its fourth year. Due to lack of demand it is being wound down and no new students will be admitted into the programme. All existing students are grandfathered in and we will do our best to offer the courses necessary for them to graduate, including any course offered in the full time programme. All existing students are automatically eligible to transfer into the full time programme.
- The Part-Time is a fee paying programme, on a per credit basis.
- The Part-Time programme was specifically developed for persons with a previous degree who are working full time. For this reason classes traditionally were only offered in the evenings. This year, with the permission of the Dean, Part Time students will be allowed to take daytime classes as well as their scheduled evening classes.

NATURE OF LLB PROGRAMMES

Summer Courses

- Law courses are generally offered in Semesters I and II, not during the summer. With permission of the Dean, students may be eligible to take:
 - out of Faculty courses, or
 - 2. up to two third year Law courses, in the summer.

EXEMPTIONS

- Exemptions are governed by the Faculty's Regulations and are determined by the Dean's Office. See Faculty Handbook. In brief, you may be exempted if:
 - 1) you completed the course <u>at UWI</u> previously. For Law courses you must have done so within the <u>last 5 years</u>.
 Courses over 5 years are evaluated on a case by case basis for obsolescence.
 - 2) you have taken courses which satisfy the requirements for equivalency for a <u>Foundation</u> course. For example:
 - <u>Caribbean Civilisation</u> a History Degree with emphasis on Caribbean history,
 - Science Medicine and Technology a broad-based Science Degree,
 - <u>Language Argument</u> an English Literature Degree
 - 3) exemptions are *not* granted for Law courses taken at other institutions

OUT OF FACULTY COURSES & EXCHANGES

Out of Faculty Courses

- In their final year regular full time students are eligible to take up to two (2) courses in another Faculty. Students must apply to take these courses, which must be <u>Level 3</u> courses, using the <u>form</u> posted on the Faculty's website.
- You must take these courses during Semester I or II of your third year, unless given special permission to do otherwise.

Student Exchanges

- Regular full time students are also eligible to spend the <u>first</u> <u>semester of your **third year** overseas</u> at another campus or another University.
- UWI has relationships with many Universities around the world at which students could spend an exchange semester. Please contact the International Office for further information about exchange possibilities.

How to Succeed

- You will be receiving advice from 2nd and 3rd year students. Be cautious about some of it. There is no 'easy' route to success.
- Unlike some of your previous classes, you cannot 'cram' information in at the last minute and succeed.
- Instead, you should study continuously throughout both semesters. This means:
 - securing the textbooks and readings in advance,
 - re-learning how to read (read <u>for</u> the assigned topic, not for general appreciation),
 - reading the assigned readings <u>before</u> each class,
 - fully preparing <u>in advance</u> for tutorials,

How to Succeed

- <u>attending</u> (course marks) and <u>participating in</u> tutorials (you do not know something until you try to explain it),
- visiting your teachers and academic advisors during their office hours for additional clarity,
- revising for exams during the course of the semester, including practicing with past exams,
- completing all <u>course work on time</u>. Note that you will be assessed by <u>multiple assessment</u>, and each assignment adds up!

FACULTY COMMUNICATIONS

- Any communication with a member of the academic or secretarial staff of the Faculty of Law must be:
 - 1. Via your 'mycavehill' email account, and
 - 2. Contain your
 - 1. first and last name and
 - student ID number.
- Faculty members will not be required to respond to emails sent from other accounts and which do not contain your name and student ID number.
- If your email account is inaccessible, please pass in a hand written note with that information and the request. Please also be sure to use all forms posted on the Law Faculty's website for your requests.

PAPERLESS TEACHING

- The Faculty no longer hands out paper or course material to students. Instead:
 - All worksheets and other course materials <u>are made available</u> to registered students online via eLearning (Moodle)
 - + Students are able to <u>access</u> these materials <u>anywhere</u> they have an internet connection, including in class or via the Law Library's free computers
 - These materials can be downloaded and should be full-text searchable
 - Paper copies of every document posted online also are <u>filed on</u>
 Reserve in the Law Library for students without access to
 computer resources.
 - + Benefits: 24/7 access; never lose materials again
 - Key: no one will be left behind

IN TROUBLE? GENERAL

- Do not try to solve all problems on your own:
 - Keep in touch with your <u>family</u> and make sure that they are fully aware of your progress.
 - Consult you assigned <u>Academic Advisor</u> for help.
 - Visit the Faculty's <u>Administrative Assistant</u>, Ms Karen Primus.
 - Visit Student Services and the Campus health clinic.
 - Book an appointment with Mr Jefferson Cumberbatch, <u>Deputy</u>
 <u>Dean (Academic and Student Affairs)</u>.
 - Book an appointment with Dr David Berry, <u>Dean of Law</u>, <u>only after</u>
 <u>you have met with the Deputy Dean and exhausted all of the</u>
 <u>above</u>.
- O Whatever you do, do not leave things until they get out of hand. It is better to address problems right away when they can still be fixed!

IN TROUBLE? FAILURES

- Many of you will not fail a single course. However if you do fail a course, this is what you must do:
 - If you fell ill during an exam or missed an exam due to illness go immediately to the Campus Chief Medical Officer for a medical note. A medical removes the penalty from a failure.
 - If you failed a Level I or Level II course, with the exception of a medical case, you will be required to re-register in and re-take the course at the first available opportunity. This means registering in the trailing course, attending lectures and tutorials, and re-doing the course work. If your academic record supports it, you may apply to the Deputy Dean to add a trailing course to your regular course load, allowing you to register in six (6) courses a semester, to stay on track for graduation.

IN TROUBLE? FAILURES

• If you failed up to two (2) Level III courses during a year at the highest level of failure (F1), you may be entitled to sit exams in those courses during the summer as **supplemental examinations** to help you graduate on time. Be careful, however, as you will receive no extra tuition prior to the supplemental exam. Thus if you did not understand it before, your re-sit may yield the same (or worse) result.

Catching Up?

- To graduate on time, in addition to the possibility of <u>adding a</u> <u>trailing course</u> (see previous slide), you may also:
 - Take up to two (2) <u>out of Faculty courses</u> in your final summer,
 - Take up to two (2) <u>Law courses</u> (if offered) in your final summer.

GRADUATING, GPA AND DEGREE GPA

- What do I need to do to graduate?
 - Pass requisite courses (regular LLB 93 credits)
 - Achieve a degree GPA of 2.0 or above ("C" average or above)
- What is a GPA or degree GPA?
 - Grade Point Average (GPA) each grade is converted into a numerical value and these are averaged over each semester, giving you your semester GPA.
 - <u>Degree Grade Point Average</u> GPA calculated only on your Level II and Level III courses. This determines whether you will receive an LLB and the class of degree.

WARNING, RTW AND THE MAGIC NUMBER 2.0

- What happens if my GPA drops below 2.0?
 - If in any semester your GPA drops below 2.0 you are issued with a WARNING.
 - If in the following semester you also receive less than a 2.0 GPA, you are REQUIRED TO WITHDRAW. You must stay out of UWI for a minimum of a year and re-apply for admission into the Faculty.
- What happens if my final degree GPA is below 2.0 but I have passed every course?
 - You are not eligible for an LLB degree from UWI.
- What happens if I fail a course four (4) times?
 - You are REQUIRED TO WITHDRAW.


