Australia-Caribbean coral reef collaboration

CERMES has joined the Australia-Caribbean Coral Reef Collaboration initiative of AusAID implemented by the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority (GBRMPA) in partnership with **CARICOM** and the Caribbean Community Climate Change Centre. In early September we participated in a workshop held recently in Soufriere, St. Lucia which brought together Caribbean and Australian reef experts to develop a prototype rapid assessment and monitoring protocol (dubbed the monitoring 'multi-tool') for addressing key information needs of coral reef managers in the Caribbean. Based on a similar protocol, 'Eye on the Reef,' used by the GBRMPA, this rapid protocol is aimed at providing real-time coral reef health assessments to help local managers stay on top of addressing key local stressors. It is designed to be conducted by day-to-day reef users such as dive operators and park rangers with minimal equipment and easy to use reporting templates. This rapid assessment tool that examines both ecological and social indicators is expected to complement the more scientifically rigorous long-term coral reef monitoring programmes that may already be in place.

The more timely and targeted information provided by this rapid protocol will be especially helpful for managers responding to incidents (hurricanes, ship groundings, etc.) and in evaluating effectiveness of management actions.

CERMES at the High Level Forum for Water Ministers

From 10-11 October the annual High Level
Forum for Ministers with responsibility for
Water in the Caribbean met in Barbados to
discuss "Wastewater Policy and Finance
Challenges in the Caribbean." Over the two
days there were a series of presentations that
explored from a policy perspective, wastewater
management practices in the Caribbean and the
linkages to financing and cost recovery. There
was agreement that wastewater services make



a positive contribution to social, economic development but that a lack of investment poses a serious problem as reflected in the final Ministerial Declaration. CERMES through Adrian Cashman was involved in the organisation of the Ministerial meeting, which was attended by five ministers and five country representatives. Dr Cashman assisted the meeting in preparing the final Ministerial Declaration.

LEAP-CARICOF workshop

Antonio Joyette (CERMES PhD candidate) recently participated in a combined training and sensitisation workshop in Barbados from 15-17 October. The event was facilitated by the CARIBSAVE Partnership and held at the Ministry of Environment and Drainage. It included training on the Long Range Energy Alternative Planning (LEAP) System Model for Greenhouse Gas Mitigation Assessment and promotional activities on the Caribbean Climate Outlook Forum. Several stakeholders from research, government and non-government organisations attended.

The new (LEAP) software tool for assessing greenhouse gas emission at the country level also allows for projection of such emissions given variations in the suite of energy options employed by a given country. The training sessions were facilitated by representatives of the Stockholm Environmental Institute (SEI) -

Dr Charlie Heaps, creator of the model and Mr Taylor Binnington.

The CARICOF component of the workshop was geared towards sensitising technical stakeholders on the availability of Caribbean Climate (mainly precipitation) forecast and soliciting their inputs in terms of making the product usable among themselves. It was facilitated by Dr Cedric van Meerbeeck and Ms Shelly-Ann Cox.

CRFM/CNFO/CTA workshop

Maria Pena represented CERMES at the CRFM/CNFO/CTA Workshop on Regional

Fisheries Policies, 7-8 October in Georgetown, Guyana. The main objective of the workshop convened by the Caribbean Regional Fisheries Mechanism (CRFM) in collaboration with the Caribbean Network of Fisherfolk Organisations (CNFO) and the Technical Centre for Agricultural and Rural Cooperation (CTA) was to develop policy recommendations for presentation by a CNFO representative at the meeting of The Alliance for Sustainable Development of Agriculture and the Rural Milieu in the Wider Caribbean.

During two working group sessions, participants of the workshop drafted key statements for presentation at The Alliance meeting. These statements on various fisheries guidelines, strategies and policies and conventions were to be based on the fisherfolk perspective. Statements on the FAO Code of Conduct for Responsible Fisheries; Voluntary Guidelines on the Responsible Governance of Tenure; the development of Small-scale Fisheries Guidelines; ILO Fishing Convention (C-188) and Recommendations (R-199); Caribbean Community Common Fisheries Policy; and Castries (St. Lucia) Declaration on Illegal, Unreported and Unregulated (IUU) were presented at The Alliance meeting by Mitchell Lay, CNFO.

Ministers urge expedited approval of CCCFP

Following the CRFM/CNFO/CTA Workshop on Regional Fisheries Policies, the 4th Special Meeting of the Ministerial Council of the Caribbean Regional Fisheries Mechanism (CRFM) was held at the CARICOM Secretariat in Turkeyen, Greater Georgetown, Guyana, on 10 October, 2013. The Ministerial Council reiterate its support for the Caribbean Community Common Fisheries Policy (CCCFP) drafted in 2011 and calls on Member States to ensure that their internal consultations are expedited to facilitate this approval.
