

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT



Sir Paul Altman Chairman

I am honoured to present to Council, the Annual Report of the Cave Hill Campus for the Academic Year 2023-2024, a year of notable progress, innovation, and achievement. Over the past year, the Campus has undergone a transformative period in research, innovation and entrepreneurship, reinforcing its reputation as a leader in higher education.

The Council acknowledges the leadership role of the Campus in pioneering research, particularly in addressing environmental challenges and advancing the UN Sustainable Development Goals. A significant achievement in this effort is the innovative research into the influx of Sargassum seaweed, affecting the shores of Caribbean islands. Of note is the Rum and Sargassum project which investigated the conversion of Sargassum into biofuel to power motor vehicles. The Council commends the Campus for the successful development of *Test Drive Zero*, the first Sargassum biofueled-powered vehicle.

The commendable accomplishments in research and innovation by the Campus was bolstered by strategic partnerships negotiated with key organisations at the national, regional and international levels. Strengthening of industry collaborations facilitated the translation of research into real-world applications, and laid the foundation for possible revenue-generation for both the Campus and its industry partners. The Council wishes to express support for these collaborations and their potential to spur commercialised activity.

Council notes that entrepreneurship among faculty and students continued to thrive through opportunities made available by the Campus.

Competitions such as *Innovate! The Campus New Venture Challenge* and the Student Entrepreneurial Empowerment Development (SEED) Business Plan Competition led to the successful launch of several start-ups, driven by emerging technologies and creative solutions. Such ventures underscore the Campus' commitment to fostering innovation and preparing students for the evolving economic landscape.

The report highlights the approaches taken towards continued internationalisation of the Campus. Of particular note is the launch of the Bachelor of Science in Pre-Clinical Sciences, a joint programme with the University of Ghana. The Campus was delighted to admit the first Ghanaian student to the programme at the start of the academic year. The Council extends gratitude to the Student Enrolment and Retention Unit (SERU), the Centre for English Language Learning (CELL) and the Confucius Institute for promoting The UWI Cave Hill Campus as the university of choice for international students.

The Campus upheld its tradition of excellence in research output during the year under review. Faculty contributed several books, book chapters, journal articles, technical reports and conference papers. The research output demonstrates that the creative thinking and novel approaches needed to drive innovation and entrepreneurship are well established within the Campus community. Council acknowledges with appreciation this scholarly work which solidifies the academic reputation of the University.

Reflecting its commitment to academic excellence, the Campus actively pursued curriculum renewal in 2023-2024. Council lauds the introduction of new courses and programmes which align with industry requirements and advancements in artificial intelligence, digital technology, and automation. These curriculum enhancements ensure that Cave Hill graduates remain competitive in a rapidly evolving job market.

The Council congratulates the graduating class of 2023 for achieving commendable graduation results in various disciplines across all seven Faculties. Many have secured prestigious scholarships and internships, further demonstrating their academic excellence. In addition to their academic achievements, students have excelled in sports, cultural activities, and community engagement, strengthening Cave Hill's reputation as an institution that nurtures well-rounded individuals.

The expansion and enhancement of student support services by the Campus to create a conducive environment for student academic success and personal growth is duly noted. Support services were enhanced in the areas of counselling, career guidance, health and wellness, mentorship and entrepreneurship development. Key measures were also implemented to improve access and provide greater support for students with disabilities. These enhancements were complemented by improvements in physical facilities including classroom spaces and the Halls of Residence.

The appointment of staff to national, regional, and international committees is acknowledged. Council commends those faculty members who received awards for excellence in teaching, research, and community service. Council takes this opportunity to extend congratulations to Dr Stacy Blackman on her elevation to the rank of Professor.

The Council thanks the Campus for its dedication to ensuring administrative viability and overall efficiency. With the implementation of the Banner SaaS Modernisation Project which commenced in 2024, the Campus will become a more efficient, modern, and innovative institution.

The Council expresses sincere gratitude to the Campus Community for its support throughout the academic year which has enabled the achievements recorded in this Report. The contributions of the Barbados and other regional governments, local and regional private sector partners, international donors and alumni are also sincerely appreciated. The collective efforts of all stakeholders have contributed to the successes achieved to date under the Campus' medium-term vision of *Creating Value from our Ideas*.

As I demit office, I would like to thank the University for the opportunity to serve as Chairman of Campus Council for the last 15 years. During this time, I have observed the transformation of the Cave Hill Campus as it responded to the changing needs of Barbados and the region. 


PRINCIPAL'S OVERVIEW

The University of the West Indies (UWI)
Cave Hill Campus is pleased to present its
Report to Council for the Academic Year
2023/2024. This year's report shows that the
Cave Hill Campus sustained the momentum
generated in the previous academic year,
which was marked by the celebration of its
Diamond Jubilee – a significant milestone
commemorating 60 years of institutional
excellence. This historic event was
accompanied by a series of impactful and
well-executed activities that highlighted the
Campus' achievements and legacy.

The 60th anniversary year marked the second year of full return to face-to-face classes by students. In this context, the Campus maintained its focus on enhancing and expanding student support services, having registered a marginal decline in enrolment at both the undergraduate and postgraduate levels when compared to the previous year. Priority was given to the implementation of various measures to address this development. All specialised units with responsibility for expanding access and driving recruitment were fully engaged in the execution of new strategic initiatives to increase enrolment numbers.

During the 2023-2024 academic year, the Campus realised a substantial reduction in energy consumption through the ongoing work of the Renewable Energy Committee. As a beneficiary of the Sustainable Energy Investments Programme (Energy Smart Fund II) funded by the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) and the European Union (EU), the Campus is expected to

benefit from sustainable energy building retrofits, solar photovoltaic systems and training in renewable energy.

Throughout the review period, the Campus strengthened its position as a leader in Caribbean research and innovation, undertaking projects with substantial regional and international implications. The Faculty of Medical Sciences achieved a major breakthrough with the establishment of the Cannabis Research and Development Laboratory, which received official licensing from the Barbados Cannabis Licensing Authority in December 2023.

The Campus has also been at the forefront of innovative research addressing environmental challenges and promoting sustainable development. Significant achievements have been recorded in research which explored innovative ways to control and utilise the Sargassum seaweed proliferating the shores of Caribbean islands.

Principal's Overview

One of the highlights of the academic year under review, was the appointment of Dr Trisha Tannis as the first female Chair of Campus Council, Cave Hill. As Chairman of the Barbados Private Sector Association and Managing Director of the Unicomer (Barbados) Group, she brings a wealth of experience and business acumen to her new role. Dr Tannis is a past recipient of an honorary Doctor of Laws LLD from The UWI.

At the same time, the Campus bid farewell to the outgoing Chairman, Sir Paul Altman and recorded its appreciation for his exemplary support and outstanding service over the last 15 years.

The Campus wishes to place on record its appreciation to all staff and students for readily embracing and responding to the call to action as expressed in its medium-term vision of *Creating Value from our Ideas* in support of the Revenue Revolution phase of The UWI Triple A Strategy.

INNOVATION AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP

From Concept to Implementation: Creating Value from our Ideas

As the Campus works to support and nurture innovation and entrepreneurship, the growing entrepreneurial culture amongst faculties, departments, units and centres inspired a notable increase in spin-out activity. During the 2023-2024 academic year, the Campus engaged in projects which combined innovation with sustainability in keeping with its strategic focus.

Pioneering Solutions to Sargassum Proliferation

The Cave Hill Campus has been conducting research into the influx of the invasive Sargassum seaweed plaguing the shores of Caribbean islands since its first appearance in 2011. Staff and student researchers from the Faculty of Science and Technology (FST) and the Centre for Resource Management and Environmental Studies (CERMES), continued to conduct groundbreaking research in the review year.

Of note, was the research project led by Dr Legena Henry, Lecturer in Renewable Energy, FST and CEO of Rum and Sargassum Inc, a pioneering biofuel company. Assisted by a team of students, Dr Henry investigated the conversion of Sargassum biomass into biofuel capable of powering motor vehicles using rum industry wastewater and Barbados Blackbelly sheep manure. Notable achievements of this project in the 2023-2024 academic year include the securing of investments from Future Barbados and Environment Next. The proof of concept culminated in a demonstration of the first sargassum biofuel-powered vehicle, titled Test Drive Zero. Test Drive Zero garnered significant global media attention, with a BBC Podcast dedicated to the initiative - BBC podcasts: (https://www.bbc.co.uk/sounds/play/p0k7wt19) as well as a profile of Dr Henry carried in the leading scientific journal *Nature* (https://www.nature.com/articles/d41586-024-03684-9).

Mention must also be made of the research of Dr Srinivasa Popuri, Senior Lecturer in Analytical Chemistry, FST. His research into the extraction of alginate from Sargassum has attracted investor interest and is expected to lead to the establishment of a pilot manufacturing plant in Barbados. Alginate can be used for a variety of consumables, including textiles, cosmetics, wastewater treatment, food, welding, dentistry and pharmaceuticals. The Campus collaborated with Diproinduca, a global company that specialises in by-product management and alternative raw materials production regarding the testing and commercialisation of this research.

Adding to the list of innovative research projects on Sargassum was the discovery of a new microorganism in decomposing sargassum biomass by Dr Bidyut Mohapatra, also in the FST. This new microorganism named *Chrysobacterium Barbadensis* (species novel) in honour of Barbados, is thought to play a role in accelerating the breakdown of Sargassum, again with commercial potential.

CERMES continued to provide a free Sargassum Forecasting service to Caribbean governments and the general public. The department also secured funding to expand research in new areas related to Sargassum. This would add to existing studies focused on modelling and prediction of influxes using drones and Geographic Information System (GIS) software to monitor and map influxes; assessing the impact of Sargassum on fisheries; as well exploring sustainable strategies for managing Sargassum influxes, including potential challenges and opportunities.

Entrepreneurship and Innovation

The establishment of Faculty Entrepreneurship Committees has resulted in a heightened emphasis on innovation challenges at the Campus. The annual Innovate! The Campus New Venture Challenge instituted in 2022, continued to generate keen competition among participating teams and laid the foundation for the introduction of an array of new and exciting products and services. The competition, which is coordinated through The Office of Business Development (OBD) at the Cave Hill Campus and CIBC Caribbean, rewards staff for impactful and innovative ideas with income generating potential for their unit/department and the Campus.

This competition complements existing entrepreneurial challenges among the student body, such as the annual Student Entrepreneurial Empowerment Development (SEED) competition.

The 9th SEED Business Plan Competition finals took place on November 8, 2023, at the Sagicor Cave Hill School of Business and Management. CIBC FirstCaribbean International Bank has been the title sponsor since the competition's inception, disbursing BBD 270,000 to support start-ups and expansions for students of the Cave Hill Campus and graduates across the region. This edition of the competition showcased SEED's tradition of addressing issues affecting Caribbean society and presented pandemic businesses conceptualised by students. Winning entries focused on food security, the provision of virtual administrative services and securing Barbados' housing stock through an innovative rafter anchoring system.

SEED continued to hone participants' skills and help them conceptualise and develop innovative businesses, which ultimately generate employment. CIBC complements this training and mentorship by providing essential funding to jumpstart the ventures.

These competitions underscore the Campus' commitment to innovation and entrepreneurship by providing students and staff with innovation research opportunities.

INTEGRATING INITIATIVES WITH GLOBAL SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS (SDGs)

As part of a fully SDG-engaged university, the Campus executed a range of new and ongoing projects during the 2023-2024 period. These initiatives were strategically aligned with several SDGs including: SDG 2: Zero Hunger; SDG 3: Good Health and Well-Being; SDG 4: Quality Education; SDG 5: Gender Equality; SDG 7: Affordable and Clean Energy; SDG 13: Climate Action; SDG 15: Life on Land and SDG 17: Partnerships for the Goals.

Many of these initiatives, some of which are listed below, were interdisciplinary in nature and addressed multiple SDGs simultaneously thereby resulting in a broader impact.

The Centre for Biosecurity (CBS)

advanced the research project entitled "Climate, Wildfires & Health in Barbados" funded by the Caribbean Catastrophe Risk Insurance Facility Segregated Portfolio Company (CCRIF SPC), a climate change funding source in the Caribbean in the amount of USD 24,250. This study aims to understand the impact of climate on wildfire hazards (sugarcane, grass, and rubbish fires) and their impact on air pollution levels in Barbados. Through this project, drone technology was made available to the Barbados Fire Service (BFS) to permit the collection of critical data related to burn size estimation of wildfires and aid in firefighting coordination through fire monitoring from an aerial view. Additionally, several low-cost remote air pollution monitors were successfully installed at the relevant wildfire hotspots near to residential communities (fire stations and polyclinics) to better understand the localised

ambient air pollution exposure levels and risks for adjacent Barbadian communities. Training in the use of drone technology or unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) was also provided to a select group of Barbados Fire Service officers.

The Shridath Ramphal Centre (SRC)

 in collaboration with Yale University and Tufts University continued work on the project "Remaking Trade for a Sustainable Future", underpinned by a USD 600,00 grant from the Open Society Foundation. The project aims to reform the rules of the international trade system so that they are more supportive of achieving the SDGs. A significant achievement in 2023-2024 was the introduction of the Villars Framework for a Sustainable Trade System in September 2023 and the publication in January 2024 of the Villars Framework 2.0 https://remakingtradeproject. org/villars-framework which set out ideas for the WTO to reform its core principles and institutional features to become more responsive to the SDGs. SRC Director, Dr. Jan Yves Remy is commended for her leadership in coauthoring this landmark WTO report with two leading global trade experts from Yale and Tufts University.

Institute for Gender and Development Studies: Nita Barrow Unit (IGDS: NBU)

secured funding for the provision of employment and entrepreneurial opportunities in sustainable farming in Barbados. Through its BLOOMing Youth Project, the IGDS: NBU offers training in organic farming practices. The Climate Smart Agricultural Practices & Employment/Entrepreneurship Preparation course which commenced in April 2024, forms part of a mentorship programme for youth who had been committed, or remanded for at least one month to the Government Industrial School (GIS). Students were afforded the opportunity to attend the "Plug in the Sun" workshop hosted by Robot Adventures Inc.

Farewell to Sir Paul Altman

The Campus recorded its appreciation to the outgoing Chairman, Sir Paul Altman, whose association with the Cave Hill Campus began in 2003, following his appointment as Chancellor's Nominee to Finance and General Purposes Committee, Cave Hill. In 2008, Sir Paul was presented with the Caribbean Luminary Award by The UWI and inducted into the Chancellor's Circle during that same year. He is a past recipient of an honorary Doctor of Laws (LLD) degree from The UWI (2009) and was appointed Chairman of Campus Council in 2010. The Campus thanked Sir Paul for his outstanding service to The UWI and the Cave Hill Campus over the last 15 years and extended best wishes for the future.

Cave Hill Prepares for Reaccreditation

Following a highly successful mid-term accreditation inspection, the Cave Hill Campus commenced preparations in 2023-2024 for re-accreditation in 2026. In compliance with the Barbados Accreditation Council's institutional accreditation criteria, the Campus had also completed and submitted its Annual Accreditation Report for the period June 18 – July 17, 2024. The report provided information on measures implemented by the Campus to maintain compliance during the reporting period and included details of planned initiatives for the next five years.

With the Strategic Plan at the forefront of its planned initiatives, the report indicated that the Campus would continue to build on sustainability and innovation. In addition, emphasis would be placed on the establishment of income-generating centres to monetise innovative research which would redound to the benefit of not only the Campus, but would have national, regional and global impacts. Expansion of access, the provision of developmental opportunities for staff and students and the incorporation of artificial intelligence (AI) in its operations in keeping with global trends was also on the agenda.

THE UWI TRIPLE A STRATEGY 2022-2027: PHASE II The Revenue Revolution

Review of Cave Hill's Achievements 2023-2024

The 2023-2024 academic year marked the second year of The UWI Triple A Strategy: The Revenue Revolution. Creating value from our ideas and research continued to be a pivotal driver of initiatives undertaken during the review year, with a concerted effort to translate research outputs and ideas into commercialised activity.

Collaborating for Sustainable Development

In the review year, the Campus continued to add value to industry, economies, governments, and society by supporting multi-disciplinary research and innovative ideas that tackle global issues and advance the United Nations (UN) Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). This was in large measure achieved by forming and nurturing significant partnerships with key organisations and policy influencers to maximise research impact, and by offering tuition that prepares the next generation of leaders to tackle these issues.

Global collaborations in higher education play a major role in advancing the UN's Sustainable Development Agenda as Higher Education Institutions have an intrinsic duty to establish more sustainable societies. Since international higher education partnerships bring together a variety of partners from different disciplines and sectors, they are better suited to address societal issues than single organisations. Nevertheless, while the Campus strongly acknowledges that high-quality research and important commercial partnerships generate significant economic impact, one of its primary mandates is also to make a significant cultural and social impact.

Through active engagement with industry partners, and by fostering the requisite nurturing environment, the Campus continued to spur innovation through joint research and the development of new commercial products for the local, regional, and international markets.

Innovative ideas and research emerging in academic year 2023-2024 include but were not limited to the following:

The Renewable Energy-powered Silent Terminator (REST)

The REST device is designed to attract and kill flying, biting insects, powered by green energy and without the use of harmful toxic chemicals (insecticides). The device aims to reduce the number of mosquitos, potential infections, diseases, insecticide resistance in flying biting insects, and air pollution, thus contributing to a cleaner healthier environment and less harmful climate impact.

The Barbados Diabetes Reversal Project

Research conducted at the George Alleyne Chronic Disease Research Centre (GA-CDRC) led by Dr Kim Quimby and PhD student Ms Eden Augustus has demonstrated that diabetes can be placed into remission based on a six-week liquid diet utilizing meal replacement shakes. This approach has been successfully adapted using local plant-based ingredients and implemented in a community setting. This important innovation project, following an intensive period of testing and validation of the Cave Hill low calorie shake product with an industry partner, has now reached the stage of signing of a Licensing Agreement. This has paved the way to manufacture and distribute the product, in twenty Caribbean countries initially. The commercialisation of a co-branded low-calorie meal replacement liquid product directly supports the mission of the Campus by enabling cutting-edge research to be transferred from the laboratory and into the hands of consumers to address public health needs, while opening alternative revenue streams by licensing our intellectual property.

Small Ruminant Proposal

One of the key projects housed within the Dukes Agri-Industrial Park is the Small Ruminant Proposal which seeks to enhance livestock production, support local farmers, boost agricultural innovation, and contribute to food security that will positively impact the community, society, and the Campus. Another core project under this initiative is the *Medicinal Plants Project* which not only focuses on the cultivation and research of native plants with medicinal properties, but also on generating revenue through the development of new healthcare products.

The third project proposed under this initiative is the Silvopasture Initiative which involves the integration of trees into pastureland, thus promoting sustainable land use, environmental conservation, and new income streams for farmers.

Modernisation of Campus Operations through Digital Transformation

Digital transformation plays a substantial role in shaping university operations today as institutions strive to remain competitive in an increasingly digital

world. The Cave Hill Campus has launched a comprehensive digital transformation project to integrate the university's operations, in areas of student admission, registration, finance, human resources, and teaching and learning onto a single platform. The Banner SaaS Modernisation Project which commenced in 2024 will transform the Cave Hill Campus into a more efficient, modern, and innovative institution. This will redound to the ultimate benefit of all staff, students and other Campus stakeholders.

Internationalisation Strategy

The Campus continued to work towards boosting its global profile to become the university of choice for students and staff. Through its internationalisation strategy, the Campus engaged in quality international partnerships, providing expanded and more accessible student mobility opportunities. A noteworthy partnership rolled out in keeping with the Campus's internationalisation strategy was the 3+3 Pre-Clinical Sciences degree programme in collaboration with the University of Ghana. With the first students registered in the programme, the second phase is to roll out the initiative to other African Universities.

Principal's Overview

A broader strategy document to help develop the international student sector in Barbados has been prepared by the Cave Hill Campus for the consideration of the Ministry of Tourism and other relevant Ministries.

Building a Future-Ready Workforce

With advancements in automation, artificial intelligence, and digital technology, employers require new skills. Higher education institutions can increase enrolment by re-evaluating their role in the workforce ecosystem and enhancing future workforce skills. In response, the Campus continually revises its degree offerings, at undergraduate and postgraduate degree levels. Examples of new degree offerings include:

- Minor Sustainable Energy Management
- Minor in Sustainability of the Caribbean
- BBA Aviation Management (may be taken with or without a Pilot License)

- MPhil/Phd Biorisk Management

The Cave Hill Campus recognises that to stay abreast of evolving workforce needs, students may opt for short courses at sub-degree level. The UWI Cave Hill Campus advocates for "co-creation" of new academic programmes to ensure relevance at the inception stage, with partners in government, industry, NGOs and other universities. Among recent co-created degree programmes are joint offerings with McGill University, The University of Ghana, The University of Dayton School of Law, The Pan-American Health Organisation, and The Barbados Aircraft and Aviation Services Company. Among CPDLL certificates are offerings co-created with the National Culture Foundation, the Barbados Revenue Authority, The Eastern Caribbean Central Bank, The Caribbean Confederation of Credit Unions, and Yello Media.

The Cave Hill Campus therefore prepares students for the modern workforce environment by adapting its degree programmes, rethinking curricula, and expanding offerings beyond traditional degrees to include skills certifications, alignment public and private sector demand.

Over the next academic year, the Campus will strengthen its infrastructure to ensure financial stability by leveraging innovation, improving core university activities, fostering internationalisation, and diversifying revenue sources. Further, the Campus will sustain efforts to achieve strategic goals by fostering an entrepreneurial climate, enhancing digital capabilities, and expanding student access regionally and globally. Committed to teaching, research, and value creation, the Campus will act as an incubator for innovative ideas, supporting investments and sustainability initiatives. It will also promote staff efficiency, a healthy work environment, and stronger alumni engagement to diversity revenue streams, ensuring a future that is open connected, and purposeful.

ACCESS

Student Demographics

Enrolment¹

As at January 01, 2025 total enrolment stood at 5935 with 4959 students enrolled in undergraduate programmes (83.5%) and 976 students enrolled in postgraduate programmes (16.4%) representing a marginal decrease in enrolment of 4.6% over 2023-2024 enrolment figures. The Faculty of Social Sciences again recorded the largest number of students enrolled at 2,920, followed by the Faculty of Science and Technology with 1199 students.

Barbadian nationals comprised 80.7% of total enrolment and as in previous years, continue to be the largest group at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. In terms of gender, male enrolment remained steady at 33.6% of total enrolment, but as in previous years, females continued to dominate at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels (66.4%).

Graduation Performance

Undergraduate and postgraduate students at the Cave Hill Campus continued to perform commendably. The class of 2023 was recognised in ceremonies held on October 21, 2023. A total of 1247 students were awarded degrees, diplomas and certificates, with 875 conferred at the undergraduate level and 372 at the postgraduate level. At the undergraduate level, 121 students earned first class honours degrees, representing a decrease of 35.3% compared to the previous year. Three hundred and seventy-seven (377) students earned Upper Second Class Honours, 251 Lower Second Class Honours and 81 Pass degrees. Eleven (11) honours degrees were awarded to graduates of the Faculty of Medical Sciences. The valedictorians were Mr Kiandre Weekes, who graduated with a Bachelor of Laws degree with First Class Honours

during the morning ceremony and Mr Rahym Augustin-Joseph who graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Political Science and Law with First Class Honours during the evening ceremony.

Of the 372 degrees, diplomas and certificates awarded at the postgraduate level, 11 students graduated with doctoral degrees, seven (7) from the Faculty of Medical Sciences and four (4) distributed across the Faculties of Law and Science and Technology respectively.

The Campus was pleased to confer honorary degrees on Mr Ian Hickling, Managing Director Lenstec (Barbados) Inc, Mrs Alison Hinds-Walcott, Barbados Cultural Ambassador and Mrs Trisha Tannis, Managing Director, Unicomer (Barbados) Group.

Mr Hickling was awarded the Degree of Doctor of Science (DSc) for exemplifying the principle that a world class export manufacturing company can be built in Barbados, and for maintaining and expanding the business successfully for over 26 years. In recognition of her global contribution to arts and entertainment, Mrs Hinds-Walcott was awarded the Degree of Doctor of Letters (DLitt), while Mrs Tannis was recognised for her contribution to finance, entrepreneurship and business development with the award of the Degree of Doctor of Laws (LLD).

THE STUDENT ENROLMENT AND RETENTION UNIT

Driving Student Recruitment: Strategies and Innovations

The Campus' student recruitment drive continued apace in academic year 2023-2024. The Student Enrolment and Retention Unit (SERU), ably supported by the Student Affairs Admissions Office and the Office of Marketing and Communications, engaged in a range of recruitment activities. These included the preparation of promotional material (physical and digital), the coordination of virtual information sessions to assist applicants to the Cave Hill Campus, school visits to local secondary schools, recruitment exercises at local shopping malls, fairs and other community events.

Local Outreach

During the year under review, the SERU led recruitment teams on visits to several local secondary schools to promote the Campus and its programmes and to advise prospective students regarding study options and admission requirements suited to their career interests. Visits targeted third form students about to select subjects for study at the CXC CSEC level. School visits were supplemented by recruitment exercises at local shopping malls, fairs and other community events.

Faculty Open and Taster Week Series

The SERU once again coordinated a very successful series of Faculty Open Weeks which ran from February to April, 2024. During this period all Faculties were allocated one week to showcase their programmes and provide prospective students with an insight into life and learning in their respective Faculties.

Regional Outreach

Regional recruitment initiatives undertaken during the review year consisted primarily of virtual events and in-person hosting of visiting groups. Among these was a virtual session for prospective students in Dominica organised in collaboration with the Dominica Students' Association (DOMSAC).

The SERU also provided support to the Global Campus Belize and the Belize Student Association for the promotion of an in-person Information Sharing Session at the Global Campus site for all Belizeans who had applied for entry to the Cave Hill Campus.

Visits to the Campus

Throughout the review year, the SERU hosted visits to the Campus by various groups comprising students, teachers and in some instances, parents. Generally, the format of the visits included a Campus tour and presentations by the Senior Assistant Registrar (SAR) SERU and relevant faculty on degree programmes offered. International Outreach

Recruitment and Networking Visit to Ghana and Kenya

In support of the Campus' ongoing international student recruitment efforts, the SAR, SERU accompanied by the Director of the OSSD, paid a recruitment and networking visit to Ghana and Kenya from September 30 to October 8, 2023. The purpose of the trip was to:

- Promote brand awareness of The UWI Cave Hill Campus as an attractive option for undergraduate and postgraduate higher education for prospective Ghanaian and Kenyan students, their parents/guardians, and the recruitment agents who advise them.
- Participate in the Lekkside International Education Fairs in Accra, Ghana and Nairobi, Kenya to promote enrolment in the 3+3 medical programme and other programmes.

- Further strengthen the relationship with the Barbados Mission in Accra and establish a relationship with the Mission in Nairobi as valuable partners in the recruitment and enrolment of Ghanaian and Kenyan students.
- Meet with representatives of select funding agencies in Ghana to discuss possible financial support for Ghanaian students accepted to the Cave Hill Campus.

Arising from participation in these events, the team made the following observations:

- Prospective students seemed genuinely interested in The UWI as a potential study destination.
- Most visitors to the booth inquired about scholarship opportunities, which was indicative that some element of financial aid was required to support their enrolment at the Cave Hill Campus
- Frequently asked questions focused on opportunities to work while studying, as well as living and working in Barbados after graduation.

Visit to the Barbados High Commission

During the visit to Kenya, the team paid a visit to the High Commission of Barbados to Kenya where they met with the High Commissioner H E Mr Alex

Principal's Overview

McDonald, who offered the following points for consideration by the university:

- Seventy (70%) per cent of Kenyans are under the age of 30, and needed access educational to opportunities
- There were approximately 60 universities in Kenya to serve 50 million people
- The establishment of partnerships with some of the younger universities in Kenya.
- Kenya could benefit from UWI programmes in the areas of hospitality and tourism, management, political science and banking and finance.
- Rwanda should also be a focal point for recruitment based on its youthful population
- Swahili was expected to become the third most spoken language in the world, and is spoken by over 500 million African. It could be introduced by The UWI as a taught language.

At the start of the year, the Campus welcomed the first student enrolling in the 3+3 medical programme. The SERU provided support in several areas to ensure a smooth enrolment and successful year. Support was also provided throughout the application and admission process to another prospect seeking admission to the programme for academic year 2024/25. The experience so far has shown that sustained personalised support and responsiveness were critical to successfully guide international students from interest to enrolment.

Growing Demand for International Partnerships and Collaborations

During the period under review, the SERU International Office managed the renewal of six partnership Agreements and the signing of one new Agreement, to facilitate the exchange of students and staff, and other areas of collaboration including research and joint programming.

Student Mobilities Under Standard Exchange Agreements – Inbound and Outbound

Thirty-eight (38) students chose the Cave Hill Campus for their exchange/study abroad experience in 2023-2024. The Campus welcomed for the first

time, students from Sciences Po in France and from the University of Birmingham, UK, new partners to the Campus. Conversely, 11 students from Cave Hill participated in the student exchange programme. Measures were being put in place by the SERU to increase outgoing numbers which continued to be low.

The SERU again facilitated the successful application of one Cave Hill student for the fully funded Summer Immersion Mobility in Japan. The student spent a three-week period at Sophia University, engaging with students from universities in the Pacific islands and other UWI Campuses in a programme of academic and cultural immersion.

The SERU International Office conducted pre-arrival, pre-departure and on-site orientation for students, with support from the International Affairs Committee of the Guild of Students. A new event, *Taste of Barbados*, introducing students to a sample of local dishes was well-received and would be added to the SERU's annual calendar of events.

The SERU's annual Study Abroad Fair held on February 14, 2024 attracted a large number of students who engaged with SERU staff and fellow students about exchange opportunities. Presenters at the event

included Mickaela Hinds, the first student from Cave Hill to go on exchange to South Korea, spending a semester at Sungkyunkwan University. Similarly, student Dawn Springer who spent a year on exchange at the Osaka Gakuin University (OGU) in Japan and who subsequently relocated to that country, made a presentation on her exchange experience.

Networking Visit to Birmingham Partners

In August 2023 the SAR SERU paid a networking visit to Birmingham City University and the University of Birmingham, in the United Kingdom with which partnerships had been recently established. During these visits, meetings were held with counterpart international offices with discussions focusing on the development of MOUs and potential areas for collaboration as well as strategies for successful international recruitment.

Student Engagement and Retention

Supporting the Orientation of New Undergraduate and Postgraduate Students

At Cave Hill, undergraduate orientation was well-established, while postgraduate orientation has been less structured. To address this, in 2023-2024, efforts were made in collaboration with the Director, School of Graduate Studies and Research to improve the postgraduate orientation experience. The SAR SERU organized two orientation activities for new graduate students, including a panel discussion "by Graduate Students for Graduate Students" on Surviving and Thriving in Graduate School and a workshop on Time Management for Graduate Students delivered by Professor Dwayne Devonish. Both activities were held virtually and received positive feedback from participating students.

Postgraduate Programme Orientation Guide

In collaboration with the Director, School for Graduate Studies and Research, the SERU developed a template for a comprehensive *Postgraduate Programme Orientation Guide* which was shared with programme coordinators, Deans and Heads of Departments who were encouraged to use the guide to develop similar resources to enhance the orientation experience and to guide students enrolled in taught postgraduate programmes.

Airport Meet and Greet

The SERU's annual Airport Meet and Greet service for new regional and international students was held from August 20 – September 3 between the hours of 10:00 am and 10:00 pm daily. Arriving students were presented with welcome packages containing items donated by several local businesses, including local sim cards for mobile phones.

Facilitating Student Feedback

The SERU continued to facilitate student feedback on programmes, whether initiated by students or by the SERU itself. The SERU periodically carries out such focus group sessions in keeping with the Campus' commitment to continuous improvement. During the past year the SERU interviewed students of the music programme of the Faculty of Culture, Creative and Performing Arts (FCCPA), the report from which were shared with the Dean and Head of Department.

Tablet and Laptop Loans to Students

The SERU facilitated the loan of electronic tablets to 48 students during the course of the year. The device loan scheme was introduced during the COVID-19 pandemic when the Campus transitioned to online delivery of programmes. Due to aging equipment, this service was in the process of being discontinued. The SERU would however, continue to respond to individual requests from students in need.

THE CENTRE FOR ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNING:

A Hub for Internationalisation


The Centre for English Language Learning (CELL) continued to position itself as a hub for international students, offering immersive and high-quality language programmes. Through innovative programming, the CELL once again in 2023-2024, attracted a diverse group of learners from across the region, enhancing both their language proficiency and global experiences.

Certificate in TESOL

The academic year 2023-2024 began with the online Certificate in TESOL course. One of the staples of the CELL, this session saw eight students from across the Caribbean enrolled in the course, which was taught in two sections during the period September 11 to October 20, 2023 and October 30 to December 8, 2023. The students were appreciative of what they learned and articulated this in unsolicited emails as exemplified below. In speaking to the instructors on the course, one student stated:

I know it has been nearly a month since the last TESOL cohort submitted their final E-portfolios, but it has been a long overdue return for me to say a big thank you for the role each of you played in guiding us so well on this journey. I want you to know that I appreciated the valuable insight and tools each of you provided to make this journey a bright, memorable and deeply impactful one (Phylicia Joseph).

The sixth installment of the course, ran from February 12 to May 1, 2024 with eight students having enrolled from across the Caribbean. In this course, students were instructed in the theory of language and language teaching in the first section, while receiving practical language teaching training in the second section.

At the end of the course, students were awarded a certificate of completion from the Eastern Caribbean Joint Board of Teacher Education, the official certifying body for the Certificate in TESOL at Cave Hill.

Business Communication for Success

CELL's Business Communication for Success (English Language Proficiency), in conjunction with the Mathematics Skills: Proficiency for the Workplace course, mounted by the Department of Computer Science, Mathematics and Physics, was designed specifically for employees at Unicomer Barbados Ltd. The course taught students how to correctly use grammar, write succinctly and clearly for their audience and how to speak clearly and confidently while negotiating comprehension through the language for fewer instances of online or face-to-face miscommunication, Sixteen (16) students enrolled in this course which began October 2 and ended December 8, 2023. The course was held in the Dodridge Miller Economic Justice Building at The UWI City Campus in Bridgetown due to its convenient location which was almost adjacent to the employees' workplace.

Aviation English

One of the highlights for the CELL in the 2023-2024 period was the teaching of Aviation English. The CELL welcomed 14 students who were instructed in the language of telephony as well as given practical flight training by experienced pilots, Derek Gardier and William "Bill" Chandler of The Flight Training Institute (Barbados) Inc. This group was represented by 12 males and two females, with one of those females, Ms Chloën Louis-Sidney receiving the prize for the Most Improved Student. Florian Barnabe was awarded the prize for the Best Overall student and Brice Leopoldie, the prize for Most Significant Class Engagement.

At the close of the Aviation English programme, two students, Clement Xima and Florian Barnabe submitted to the Aviation Language Proficiency Test, administered by the Barbados Civil Aviation Training Centre. They both received a level five linguistic description rating; level six is the highest rating. Additionally, Brice Leopoldie returned to Martinique where soon after, he was able to make a solo flight, clearly communicating with the Air Traffic Control tower in English, a feat of which he and the CELL staff were very proud.

Business Communication for Success

Based on the positive feedback received from the first cohort, a second Business Communication for Success course was mounted, which ran from February 12 to May 3, 2024. This cohort consisted of 10 students, who had high praise for the course. Their supervisors also spoke to the improvements they saw in employees' use of the language.

Students in the programme, Math and English combined, graduated on June 21, 2024 in a ceremony held at the The UWI's city campus. Dr Trisha Tannis, Managing Director of Unicomer delivered the feature remarks at the presentation ceremony, with several of Unicomer's management team in attendance.

University of Guadeloupe visit

On March 4, 2024, the CELL hosted some 50 students from the University of Guadeloupe as part of a special event organised by the Centre Formation Apprentis: Institut Universitaire des Techniciens Supérieurs (CFA IUTS) (the Apprenticeship Training Centre for Higher Technicians in Guadeloupe). Students were treated to presentations and activities in English, designed to attract prospective students to The UWI generally, and CELL, specifically.

The CELL also offered private individual tuition to non-native speakers of English in the summer session.

THE CONFUCIUS INSTITUTE

BRIDGING LOCAL AND GLOBAL COMMUNITIES

The Confucius Institute (CI) continued to successfully promote the Campus' internationalisational initiatives through its comprehensive language programmes, designed to foster cross-cultural communication and global engagement.

In recognition of the Campus' 60th anniversary, President Ma Huaide of the China University of Political Science and Law (CUPL) sent a congratulatory message to Pro Vice Chancellor and Principal Professor R Clive Landis, which noted the indelible mark The UWI had made in the education field despite its relatively small size on the global stage.

Work/Achievements of the CI in Academic Year 2023-2024

The CI implemented a number of staff changes during the reporting period. The new Co-Director, Professor Lu Nie along with other team members arrived in Barbados in November 2023, replacing the existing team led by Co-Director Dr Renyan Li who returned to China at the end of their assignment.

Chinese Language Programmes

During the review year, the CI continued to offer impactful courses, both independently and in collaboration with other departments. The course Beginners Chinese for Business and Tourism now in its fourth iteration, maintained steady enrolment, while the Mandarin Training for the Caribbean programme, had been postponed due to low interest. This was offset however by the introduction of new courses in February 2024 including Modern Mandarin Communication, HSK2 and HSK3 preparatory classes, and the extra-curricular Mandarin Training Programme for Secondary Schools. The CI continued to prepare students from the Cave Hill and St Augustine Campuses enrolled in the Software Engineering Programme for residency in China during their third and fourth years of study.

Arising from discussions held in the 2023-2024 academic year, it was agreed that the CI would be responsible for the delivery of the Minor in Chinese with effect from academic year 2024-2025.

Outreach to Primary and Secondary Schools and Specialised Markets

In the 2023-2024 academic year, the CI continued to teach Mandarin and Chinese culture classes at three (3) primary schools, with a total of twenty (25) classes catering to approximately 500 students. The CI also participated in multicultural days at various schools and made cultural presentations. A new afterschool course on Mandarin and Chinese Culture for secondary school students was announced on July 8, 2024 via an online briefing for principals, heads of department and teachers across Barbados.

Chinese language classes continued at the Barbados Community College (BCC)/Barbados Language Centre (BLC), Erdiston Teacher's Training College and the Barbados Workers' Union. The classes utilise a mixture of language and culture content to expose students to the language. One-on-one VIP classes were offered to students who needed support in preparing for the HSK test.

The CI also participated in the 2nd BCC Language Fair held on February 1, 2024, hosting a language and tourism booth which featured Chinese cultural decorations and interactive activities.

Other activities hosted in 2023-2024 included:

- Chinese Games Day, April 2024
- Third Lecture of Zhixing (Knowledge and Practice)
 Forum "Two Generations, Two Persons": A
 Dialogue with Barbadians of Chinese Origin
- The Chinese Bridge Competition 2024
- Fish and Dragon Festival and Celebration of Chinese New Year
- Mid-Autumn Festival

Collaboration with Faculty of Law

The Faculty of Law at Cave Hill and the CUPL continued their cooperation through the hosting of moot courts. The 2023 Moot Court took place at the Faculty of Law, Cave Hill on November 7,

2023. Two teams of four (4) competed on a topic related to "International Humanitarian Law and the Use of Force". The competition, presided over by Mr Andrew C Ferreira KC, ended in a draw.

The two institutions also renewed the existing Memorandum of Understanding. The revised MOU, which supports the framework for cooperation under the Joint China - Caribbean Research Centre (JCCRC) was signed by the Principal of the Cave Hill Campus and the President of the CUPL on December 12, 2023. The Terms of Reference of the JCCRC were finalised on June 3, 2024, allowing the work of the research centre to move forward.

Visit by CUPL President and Delegation

From April 27-29, 2024, a delegation from the CUPL, led by President Ma Huaide, visited Barbados to discuss strengthening academic and cultural cooperation with the Cave Hill Campus. Below are the key highlights of the visit.

Academic Engagement

Professor Zhang, Director of Academic Affairs Office, CUPL delivered a lecture on "China's Market Access Regulations" at the CI on April 26, 2024.

Government and Institutional Meetings

A breakfast meeting hosted by Senator the Honourable Lisa R Cummins Minister of Energy and Business Development discussed cooperation in maritime law, renewable energy and Chinese language education. Also in attendance were Senator the Honourable Chad Blackman, Minister in the Division of Economic Affairs and Investment, H E Yan Xiusheng, Ambassador of China to Barbados, Principal R Clive Landis, and CI Local and Chinese Directors.

The visit concluded with the signing of a Student Exchange Agreement by President Ma and Principal Landis on April 29, 2024.

CI Board Meetings 2023-2024

The virtual meeting of the CI Board was held on December 12, 2023 with Professor Lu Chunlong, Vice President, CUPL moderating the proceedings. The meeting focused on charting a pathway towards two-way student and faculty exchanges between the Cave Hill Campus and the CUPL.

The 10th meeting of the CI Board was held on June 2 (Barbados) /June 3, 2024 (Beijing) in hybrid format. Professor Lu Chunlong, Vice President, CUPL moderated the proceedings.

THE CENTRE FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND LIFELONG LEARNING

Innovating Education for the Digital Era

The Centre for Professional and Development and Lifelong Learning (CPDLL) continued to serve as a central location for providing companies and governments around the region with support for learning and training opportunities. CPDLL has assisted institutions in the re-examination of their learning and development processes to provide learning and training opportunities for employees.

This is done with the intention of ensuring the development of the modern employee who can adapt to the new realities of various industries, and in response to the rapid digitalisation and change that has occurred across a variety of industries.

In addition, the Centre acknowledges that the provision of professional development courses makes the development of skilled professionals easier, which in turn ensures the competitiveness of their company in the market and, consequently, the sustainability of the organisation.

The Centre continued to create partnerships with a wide variety of organisations and governments to impact the business environment through the development of employees with new skills and knowledge who can enhance the organisation's capacity for resilience and sustainability. Companies that make investments in their workforce ensure that their workers remain on the cutting-edge in their field and embrace lifelong learning. Furthermore, evidence suggests that organisations that invest in the growth and education of their employees are more agile and innovative. These two characteristics are among the most important factors in determining a company's resilience and sustainability.

On this basis, the courses and modules offered by the Centre provide opportunities for employees and other interested delegates to engage in continuous learning. In this way, the Centre supports organisations in providing professional development opportunities for their employees while also helping staff acquire new skills and perspectives that can enhance their work.

The Centre for Professional and Development and Lifelong Learning (CPDLL)

Mission: "To meet the lifelong learning needs of the Caribbean and the wider world by offering innovative, accessible, flexible and high-quality professional development and lifelong learning products/ services."

During the Academic Year 2023/2024, the Centre offered various courses for working professionals, executives and regional and international clients. These included short courses offered primarily in an online modality, and customised short courses for Governments and organisations. The Centre also offered postgraduate modules in in-demand fields such as project financing and procurement, and global logistics and supply chain management as these have been identified as vital to strategic decision-making and improving organisational performance through the provision of insights from data.



The Government of Barbados

CPDLL maintained its collaboration with the Government of Barbados by offering educational and training assistance to enhance the skills and competencies of public service employees. Between March 19 and 22, 2024 the CPDLL offered a customised short course in *Policy Formulation and Implementation* for delegates from the Government of Barbados. Also, between October 12 and December 7, 2023, delegates from the Government of Barbados completed a course in *Effective Writing Skills for the Public Service*. Employees at various management levels were offered short courses which covered the key areas necessary for the development of the public service in Barbados.

Short Courses and Customised Programmes Sponsored by Companies and Government Agencies

During the Academic Year 2023-2024, various organisations and government agencies continued to invest in their employees' development by sponsoring their enrolment in courses offered by the CPDLL. Table 3 provides further details.

Growth of CPDLL

Although there was a decrease in enrolment in customised short courses during the 2023-2024 period, an increase in enrolment in short courses for organisations and governments (26%) was recorded.

Courses that assist with the expansion, development, and long-term viability of organisations have been continuously developed by the Centre. Over the course of the academic year, the Centre focused on the development of courses that would provide delegates with the requisite skills to address a variety of challenges in the corporate environment. As a result, the CPDLL established new certificates and short courses in the following subject areas:

ALIGNMENT

Forging Ahead with Strategic Partnerships

The Campus remained focused on partnering with key stakeholders as part of its commitment to fostering a triple helix relationship involving The UWI, government entities and private sector companies. This partnership aims to create a conducive environment for research, innovation and the export of knowledge. By leveraging the unique strengths and resources of each sector, the Campus aims to drive sustainable growth and development. Additionally, these global collaborations enhance The UWI's academic reputation and contribute to advancing the UN's Sustainable Development Agenda.

Notable Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) and Agreements negotiated in academic year 2023-2024 include the following:

InterCaribbean Airways and The UWI Cave
 Hill Campus – signed February 29, 2024. The
 MOU will support the development of aviation
 students and promote the growth of the regional

transport industry. Five (5) annual scholarships named in honour of Manville "Donnie" Gardiner, the late brother of the founder and Chairman of the company Lyndon Gardiner will be awarded to Caribbean undergraduate students enrolled in aviation programmes including the newly approved Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) in Aviation Management and Aviation Management with Pilot License respectively.

- Inter-American Court of Human Rights (IACtHR) and The UWI, Cave Hill Campus signed April 25, 2024. Areas of cooperation under the MOU include improved capacity-building, joint research opportunities and other areas of mutual benefit for both institutions. Deliverables include yearly professional practicum programmes for staff and graduates of the Campus and student internships with the Court.
- United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) and The UWI, Cave Hill Campus - signed June 18, 2024 in Geneva. This MOU builds on the decades-long cooperation between UNCTAD and the Cave Hill Campus. Since 2012, UNCTAD had been hosting an annual study tour for MITP students. The MOU strengthens joint research on trade-related topics

- of particular relevance to the Caribbean region and enhances capacity building through student study tours.
- The China the China University of Political Science and Law and The UWI Faculty of Law, Cave Hill Campus signed December 12, 2023. This revised MOU supports the framework for cooperation under the Joint China - Caribbean Research Centre (JCCRC). This Centre was developed to facilitate research in areas of mutual interest to China and the Caribbean, focusing on resilience and sustainable development strategies. The JCCRC supports research exchanges and collaborative studies on environmental policy, public health, and regional development, creating an influential partnership between Caribbean and Asian academic institutions. This Centre will contribute to UWI's goal of fostering international academic cooperation, enhancing the campus's research capacity, and addressing Caribbean-specific challenges in a global context.

INDUSTRY PARTNERSHIPS

Unicomer Business Communications and Mathematics Proficiency Programme

Two cohorts of Unicomer employees successfully completed their Unicomer Business Communication for Success and Mathematics Skills Proficiency for the Workplace programme with The UWI, Cave Hill Campus, through the Department of Computer Science Mathematics and Physics and the Centre for English Language Learning. This represented another successful revenue-generation effort

Tourism Hospitality Authority of Guyana (THAG)

 The Department of Management Studies in collaboration with THAG engaged in an initiative to build out the tourism sector of Guyana through research and product development.
 The collaboration also entailed training and the development of joint programmes.

Contributing to National Development through Government Partnerships

Throughout academic year 2023-2024, the Cave Hill Campus continued to play a significant role in the critical area of national development in Barbados. This was achieved largely through collaborations with various government entities across a range of research/project areas.

In an unprecedented step taken by the Government of Barbados to host the Inter-American Court of Human Rights in-person public hearings, the Court held its 166th Regular Session of the Inter-American Court of Human Rights at the Cave Hill Campus, in the Sagicor Cave Hill School of Business and Management from April 22-26 2024. This marked the first time this prestigious event was held in the Caribbean.

The session which was officially inaugurated in a ceremony, included an International Seminar on the "Impact and Challenges of International Human Rights Law" which was part of its regular session, and a public hearing on the "Climate Emergency and Human Rights" which was held in response to a request for an advisory opinion submitted by Colombia and Chile.

A week-long series of discussions were initiated on human resources and the climate crisis, underscoring the need for dialogue and international cooperation.

The Department of Management Studies, Faculty of Social Sciences engaged in collaborations with various government agencies to advance national development and contribute to national policy. In 2023-24, the Department partnered with:

the Barbados Tourism Management Inc (BTMI):
(i) to assess the Barbados tourism product
with a view to identifying areas of weakness
and provided recommended improvements;
and (ii) to provide a comprehensive inventory
of the tourism product offerings in Barbados.
This facilitated the development of new and
innovative products through the identification
of strengths and gaps. The report also
contributed to ensuring the competitiveness of
the tourism product in Barbados.

The Centre for Agricultural Research and Innovation (CAGRI) continued to advance initiatives under the Dukes Agri-Industrial Park project. Funded through a bilateral grant between the Government of Barbados and the People's Republic of China, this project will support training, research and innovation in the agriculture sector.

The Dukes Agri-Industrial Park initiative conceptualised by the Centre for Agricultural Research and Innovation (CAGRI), seeks to leverage cutting-edge pedagogical approaches and the larger educational system to enable faculty, students, and farmers to use their understanding of the food system and agroecological practices. Key projects under the this Initiative include the Small Ruminants Project, the Medicinal Plants Project and the Silvopasture Initiative.

PARTNERSHIPS WITH OVERSEAS MISSIONS

As part of its strategic focus to expand international links, the Campus engaged in collaborations with foreign missions with the goals of fostering knowledge exchange through the establishment of partnerships with other universities, strengthening economic ties and to support the Campus' innovation drive.

On March 26, 2024, Principal and Pro Vice-Chancellor Professor Clive Landis along with members of the senior management team, welcomed the Minister of Foreign Affairs of Panama, Her Excellency Janaina Tewaney Mencomo to the Cave Hill Campus. Discussions centered on matters of trade and economic cooperation as well as education and the creation of partnerships with national universities and institutions in Panama. Noting the planned establishment of an Embassy in Barbados, the Campus welcomed the opportunity to strengthen historic ties with Panama which dated back to the era when Barbadian workers travelled to Panama to work on the construction of the Panama Canal and railway.

This was followed in April 2024 by a meeting between the Principal and Pro Vice-Chancellor Professor Clive Landis and members of Faculty, and the Ambassador of Barbados to the Federative Republic of Brazil, Her Excellency Tonika Sealy-Thompson and the Honorary President of the Brazilian Institute of Social Management (IBGS), Mr Renato Werner. Discussions were held regarding partnership possibilities in the fields of education, particularly English as a Second Language.

RESEARCH COLLABORATIONS IGDS: NBU

The IGDS: NBU has received USD 54,033 from the Maria Holder Memorial Trust to implement the BLOOMing Youth Project, a continuation of the mentorship programme at the Government Industrial School (GIS). Under the initiative, 15 students of the GIS, aged approximately 14 to 17 years, who have been committed, or remanded

- for at least one month to the GIS, will be eligible for one-on-one mentorship. They will also be exposed to climate-smart farming and agricultural practices, as well as skills to support their entry into entrepreneurship and/or further study.
- Funding has been awarded by the Caribbean Community Climate Change Centre for the design and delivery of a training course on Unequal Relations of Gender, Sexual Harassment and Sexual and Gender-based Violence, The Rs (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle) for Climate Resilience Wastewater Systems in Barbados (3R-CReWS). This project was implemented by the Caribbean Community Climate Change Centre in collaboration with the Barbados Water Authority (BWA), and funded by the Green Climate Fund.
- The goal of the 3R-CReWS Project aims to facilitate the enhancement of health, wellbeing, and productivity of Barbadians through the use of carbon-neutral and climate-resilient water and energy management technologies and strategies which ensure water is protected and managed. The project is specifically focused on training staff and stakeholders of the BWA in areas of sexual harassment and gender-based violence prevention as part of the execution of a larger project on waste water management.
- The Safer Campus Initiative is a collaborative effort between The UWI, the Barbados Community College (BCC) and the Samuel Jackson Prescod Institute for Technology (SJPI). The project for which funding of BDD 10,000 was received, seeks to enhance the capacity of student leaders in recognising and responding to instances of gender-based and sexual violence in Campus communities. The workshop series trained student activists and leaders to raise awareness on issues related to consent and sexual violence among young people. The Safer Campuses Initiative enhanced the capacity of student's leaders to recognise and respond to instances of gender-based violence, sexual violence as well as homophobic and transphobic violence.

INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATION Conferences/Workshops

- On February 23-24, 2024, the Cave Hill Campus Faculty of Law partnered with Western Law's Tort Law Research Group and the Université de Montréal to host an international workshop on the Law of Nuisance. The workshop included discussions of the importance of self-help, the scope of defenses of reasonable user and ultrasensitivity, and the overlap of nuisance with torts of privacy.
- The Faculty of Law and the Sagicor Cave Hill School of Business and Management (SCHSBM) successfully hosted the 166th Regular Session of the Inter-American Court of Human Rights from April 22-26, 2024. Ms Alana Lancaster, Lecturer in Law, made a submission towards the advisory opinion written by the Court on climate emergency and human rights.

INFRASTRUCTURAL DEVELOPMENT

Ryan Brathwaite Athletic Track

The Ryan Braithwaite Athletic Track at the Usain Bolt Sports Complex, originally completed in 2011, was resurfaced to improve performance, safety and durability. Significant wear and tear had created hazards for athletes and other persons using the facility. Previously certified under the International Association of Athletics Federation's (IAAF) standards, the track was expected to regain this certification following the upgrade. Given its heavy use by students, schools and local sporting organisations, the renovations ensure a safe, high-quality facility for the community.

Student Accommodation

Work was ongoing regarding the upgrade of on-campus student accommodation during the summer of academic year 2023-2024. An additional Block at

the Frank Worrell Hall was completed as part of the Campus' commitment to enhancing the living conditions of students resident on-campus. This work brought the total number of renovated Blocks to seven, with three remaining to be completed.

Credit Union Project

This Credit Union Project, designed to provide modern, functional facilities for The UWI Credit Union, and ease the space constraints faced by the Campus Record Centre, was successfully completed in December 2023, three months later than the originally planned. Its completion marked a major milestone in improving the operation capacity of both The UWI Credit Union and the Campus Record Centre.

AGILITY

In 2023-2024, the Cave Hill Campus continued to improve its digital ecosystem at both the departmental and enterprise level. In its goal to embrace digital transformation and complement the traditional physical campus with comprehensive digital infrastructure, the Campus engaged in several initiatives. Among these were the Exam Room Check-In, an expedient student check-in system for examinations and the Requisition Management (ATACAMA) for tracking and processing documentation related to requisitions submitted to the Bursary.

Other Banner-related initiatives included the CourseDog Scheduler, a new timetable scheduling solution with integration in Banner. This solution will offer features that will enhance the scheduling process, empower users and will contribute to an improved registration process.

Additionally, several other initiatives were proposed:

- Ellucian Experience Portal a centralised portal for accessing applications, data and reports
- CRM Recruit a system which offers new recruitment capabilities and enhanced applications features and functionalities
- Banner HR facilitates the transition from PeopleSoft to Banner HR with tighter integration into the existing Banner platform for improved selfservice functionalities
- Banner Workflow improves task automation, routing information, approvals and notifications in an integrated manner.

Together, these initiatives help to improve process efficiency and reduce costs by eliminating the need for extensive physical infrastructure and automating administrative processes through digitalisation.

Further, the Campus IT Services (CITS) provided support to the Campus during the review period on a comprehensive modernization project, aimed at upgrading infrastructure and enhancing the overall work environment. This involved the transition to a single, SaaS-based ERP system, which will streamline operations and improve data management across the Campus.

The Network Services' network engineering team, partnered with local service providers Promotech, FLOW and Digicel, as well as international cybersecurity company Fortinet to provide wireless and wired connectivity for the Inter-American Court of Human Rights 166th session and public hearing of the Advisory Opinion on Climate Emergency and Human Rights held in Barbados April 22 to April 26.

The event included live streaming, language translation and special connection requirements for the Judges, court officers, representatives from 36 States and public institutions, 17 indigenous communities, more than 90 NGOs and think tanks, 70 academic institutions, and 45 special experts. The team created a network operations centre for managing the event.

Functional integration of the Department of Management Studies and the Sagicor Cave Hill School of Business and Management

A major strategic move during the year under review was the integration of the Department of Management Studies and the Sagicor Cave Hill School of Business and Management for the combined SCHSBM under an integrated operational structure. In April 2024, Finance and General Purposes Committee, Cave Hill approved a recommendation for the integration of the Sagicor Cave Hill School of Business and the Department of Management Studies. This initiative, which will take effect from August 1, 2024, is expected to result in more agile, efficient and cost-effective operations.

Name Change - Department of History, Philosophy and Psychology

During the review year, a longstanding recommendation that the discipline of Psychology be added to those of History and Philosophy had been approved. The new name of the of the Department will be the Department of History, Philosophy and Psychology. This name change will take effect in the new academic year.

Establishment of a Venue and Events Management Unit

By December 2023, plans for the establishment of a Venue and Events Management Unit had reached an advanced stage. This Unit will optimise centralised coordination and streamline events and related activities, ultimately benefitting the Campus through improved resource utilisation and increased revenue opportunities.

In addition, the Unit will also be responsible for the organisation of events and development programmes for staff members which will enhance employee engagement and morale.

These changes highlight the Campus' dedication to evolving with its academic mission and expanding curriculum and support the goals of greater administrative efficiency and innovation.

INTERNAL OPERATING PROCESSES

During the review period, the Cave Hill Campus Administration continued its efforts to implement strategies to enhance operational efficiency, student-centeredness, and customer service excellence in alignment with the University's strategic goals. Significant advancements were made in key areas, including streamlining the admissions and student registration processes, strengthening customer service, and implementing initiatives to improve health, safety, and environmental standards. The digitisation of campus records progressed steadily, reinforcing efficient archives and records management practices. Additionally, modernisation efforts spearheaded by the Campus IT Services (CITS) Department focused on upgrading the Campus' software to enhance workflow efficiency, while the introduction of smart initiatives, such as new applications, contributed to improved service delivery and operational effectiveness.

ADMISSIONS

Applications

There was a marginal decline in undergraduate applications when compared to the previous academic year, however, graduate applications saw an increase over the same period. The admissions process continued to evolve as the Student Affairs Admissions Office upheld its dedication to efficient application processing and student support. The Office continued to utilise the Cave Hill Application Documents (CHAD) system to process applications as well as enable streamlined document management and application review. The processing of supporting documents for applications remained entirely digital. While this shift enhanced processing capabilities, timely submission of documents by applicants continued to be a significant challenge, affecting overall processing efficiency.

Collaboration with the Student Enrolment and Retention Unit (SERU)

The Student Affairs, Admissions Office continued to partner with the Student Enrolment and Retention Unit (SERU) to host various recruitment events. This collaboration also included support for the customer service arm to provide thorough assistance to prospective, incoming, and current students.

Registration

The Office retained its in-person format for the registration process for new students, which included scheduled meetings with Deans, Heads and Advisors, as well as academic advising sessions. During the advising sessions, the Admissions team offered on-site support by utilising MS Teams to share documents and assist faculties with their academic advisement to students.

STUDENT ENROLMENT AND RETENTION UNIT (SERU) COMMITTED TO CUSTOMER SERVICE EXCELLENCE

The SERU works collaboratively with administrative and academic departments, in particular the Office of Student Services and Development (OSSD); the Deputy Principal's Office; the Student Affairs Admissions, Graduate Studies and Research, and Examinations Offices; the Student Accounts Department; the Enterprise Systems Services Unit (ESSU); the Student Experience Unit of the Office of Institutional Planning and Infrastructural Services (INPLAIS); and the faculties, to support initiatives and committees aimed at improving communication with and services for students, and to facilitate prompt responses to student queries and issues.

Vibrant Use of Multiple Communication Channels for Student Engagement

The SERU continued to fully utilise a wide range of channels to facilitate communication with prospective and current students and alumni, and to promote the Campus as an excellent place to study.

The SERU Customer Service and Information Centre strived to provide outstanding service to students and prospective students, their parents and guardians, staff and visitors, through its various communication mechanisms that include email, telephone, WhatsApp, social media and the Campus App, as well as a welcoming walk-in environment.

The Unit continued to issue regular newsletters and flyers to students, providing reminders of key dates and responsibilities, and to inform students regarding scholarships, internships, study abroad and other developmental opportunities. Major campaigns continued to encourage early payment of registration fees for the academic year and to inform students of the pre-billing arrangement which requires them to pay their registration fees before they can register for courses; as well as to promote collection and validation of ID cards, and to advise students regarding readiness for and access to examinations. Sixteen newsletters were issued during the year. These circulars are routinely copied to Deans, Heads of Departments and Faculty Administrative Assistants (AAs) to ensure that they are kept abreast of information being shared with students.

The SERU's Instagram and Facebook pages and YouTube Channel, the Campus App and the Alumni database were all widely and effectively utilised throughout the year as tools of information and engagement. Over the year, the followers on the SERU's Instagram continued to grow, adding almost 400 new followers and now exceeds 2,350, with another 1,700 followers on the Facebook page. The International Office Instagram page also saw steady growth in followers, with approximately 1,300 current followers. The SERU recognises the excellent work of its Media Assistant in producing the content that maintained the vibrancy and impact of these channels and earned the unit accolades for the quality of its social media presence. During the year under review, 20 videos were produced and added to the SERU's YouTube channel and shared on social media. Worthy of special note are the engaging videos that highlight the experiences of the Campus' international students. These received wide viewership beyond the usual followers of the pages due to use of appropriate hash tags. The SERU's social media promotions no doubt have contributed greatly to the growing popularity of the Campus as a site for visiting students and other forms of international partnership.

Student Online Information and Services Hub Heavily Utilised

SERU's Customer Service team responded to thousands of queries, including over 8,000 email messages and thousands of telephone calls and WhatsApp messages. Additionally, the Unit processed over 1,600 requests for student status letters. The Unit also served as the collection point for transcripts and letters of certification.


The Unit continued to work with the Campus Enterprise System Support Unit (ESSU) on the gradual roll out of the online information and services hub. A new element to the Hub was introduced in June 2024 to enable processing of status letter requests through the Hub. This was the first step towards using the Hub to manage receipt of and response to student queries and service requests.

Management of Student ID Cards – A New Assignment

The start of the 2023/24 academic year saw the SERU executing its responsibility for the management of the production, validation and dissemination of student identification (ID) cards for the first time. Amidst challenges, the SERU team and hardworking student volunteers were able to manage the process while documenting aspects of the process for improvement.

Discussions continued on the need for upgrading the old ID card production system and equipment, but the decision was taken to delay any changes pending further review.

The SERU implemented early dissemination of ID cards as an element of the live New Student Orientation programmes for both undergraduate and graduate students. This was supported by a "Get the Card" social media campaign designed to generate excitement and raise awareness of the importance and use of the Student ID Card. As a first effort it was challenging given the large number of students seeking to



collect their cards at once, but the pilot confirmed the feasibility of this initiative and the excitement it generated for new students. Photographs taken during the process of students proudly displaying their new cards were widely shared on social media. The initiative was also successful in achieving its aim of encouraging larger numbers of new students to pay their registration fees early to facilitate collection of their cards at orientation.

The SERU was proactive in working with departments to ensure that students studying remotely were provided with ID cards in a timely fashion to facilitate their access to examinations.

The Senior Assistant Registrar (SAR), SERU, places on record the exceptional dedication, teamwork, and effort of the entire SERU team whose collegial spirit, commitment to the mission and vision of the Unit, and willingness to serve as a cross-functional team, continued to underpin all that the Unit was able to achieve during the past year.

VENUE AND EVENTS MANAGEMENT

Anniversary Celebrations

The academic year began during a time of celebration, as The University of the West Indies and the Cave Hill Campus commemorated their 75th Anniversary and 60th Anniversary respectively. These milestones sparked a series of vibrant and memorable events, attracting enthusiastic participation from staff, students, alumni, partners and the general public. A diverse range of activities, including Historic Parish Hikes and Bus Tours, engaging Legacy Lectures, and a Mini Quizzes Competition were hosted by the Cave Hill Campus to celebrate its diamond jubilee.

The Process for the Establishment of the Venue and Events Management Unit

December 2023 marked a significant development with the work beginning towards the formal establishment of a Venue and Events Management Unit within the Office of the Campus Registrar. The responsibilities of the Unit will include: enhancing staff engagement and morale through events and developmental programmes led by the Staff Social Cohesion Committee; and optimising the revenue potential of the Campus' diverse venues. The staging of public events will be designed not only to generate revenue but also to position the University as a premier and highly sought-after brand within the events industry by showcasing the University's appeal and its potential as a safe, vibrant hub for top-tier functions.

In addition to organising in-house events, the Unit will also provide support and advisory services to Faculties and Departments as well as external event producers who wish to utilise the Campus' facilities. This will be accomplished through close collaboration with the Office of Institutional Planning

and Infrastructural Services (INPLAIS), the Office of Marketing and Communications and Campus Security Services, ensuring that all events are executed seamlessly and to the highest standard.

Signature Event

Beyond the Graduation Ceremonies, the year's major signature event was undoubtedly the "Principal's Fundraising Gala Dinner", which witnessed an unprecedented level of corporate sponsorship and generous contributions to the Science and Technology Innovation Fund. These events were not only a platform for celebration but also a method to strengthen relationships with alumni and external stakeholders, advancing the Campus' ongoing efforts to foster meaningful and mutually beneficial engagement.

HEALTH, SAFETY AND ENVIRONMENT (HSE)

The Health, Safety and Environment (HSE) team maintained its regular operations while also dedicating time to implement new initiatives designed to enhance efficiency and raise awareness among members of the Campus community.

Heath, Safety and Environment Scavenger Hunt

As part of the activities to promote World Day for Safety and Health at Work, the HSE team hosted its Health, Safety and Environment at Work Scavenger Hunt on April 26, 2024. The hunt was created as a fun way to educate staff on health, safety and environmental issues. Now in its third year, interest in the activity continues to grow, attracting new sponsors and participants from across the Campus.

Each year, new elements are added to the activity. This year, a display was created with the assistance of the Office of Institutional Planning and Infrastructural Services (INPLAIS). The display showcased various hazards that could exist in a workplace and participants were tasked with reviewing it to identify the unsafe conditions.

Mapping of Campus Fire Hydrants

During the review period, the team completed the first phase of the Fire Hydrant Project. This project is just one aspect of the efforts to improve the Campus' management of emergencies, through the warning and response systems.

The Geo Mapping of the fire hydrants on the Main Campus, identifying the locations of all the devices and plotting the GPS coordinates were undertaken by the HSE Compliance Assistant in collaboration with the Smart Campus Coordinator. This information was then plotted on the map of the Campus and shared

with relevant departments including Campus Security Services.

The Fire Hydrant Project provides critical information and enhances the capabilities of the Barbados Fire Service in the event that they are required to respond to a fire on the Campus.

Safety Warden SharePoint Site

The Safety Warden SharePoint site is being developed as a repository for all information applicable to the Department Safety Wardens. Once completed, the site will provide up-to-date information on Department Safety Wardens, important notices, Campus policies, training events and meetings. It will also provide the wardens with access to educational videos on pertinent health, safety and environmental topics.

HSE Helpdesk App

The HSE Helpdesk was officially launched in January 2023. During the review period, the team collaborated with the Smart Campus Coordinator to assess the system and ensure it remains fully functional while also capturing the relevant information.


Disposal of Biological Waste

All biological waste generated on the island is generally incinerated at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital (QEH) which is the government-approved site for this disposal. The incinerator was out of operation for several months which resulted in a number of challenges for waste generators on the island. This was compounded by the fact that an alternate location was not officially identified to deal with this type of waste.

During this period, the team worked tirelessly with the QEH, the Ministry of Health and Wellness and other regulatory agencies as well as the waste generators on the Campus to find acceptable and creative ways to deal with the biological waste which continued to be generated by operations on the Campus.

Compliance Inspections with Regulatory Agencies

Meetings and inspections were conducted with officers of the Barbados Fire Service and the Ministry of Health and Wellness. Routine inspections of Campus facilities were also undertaken to monitor compliance and highlight issues that required attention.

ARCHIVES AND RECORDS MANAGEMENT PROGRAMME (ARMP)

Record Digitising Programme

The Archives and Records Management Programme (ARMP) continued to lend support to the digitisation of the records of the Human Resources Section and the Payroll and Benefits Section of The Bursary. The Human Resources Section is now fully working with records on the Electronic Document Management System (EDRMS) HP Content Manager. This was done in tandem with the digitisation of paper-based files. The scanning of the records of the Payroll and Benefits Section continued.

Indexing

The ARMP digitisation of records for administration for the review period saw 30,284 records scanned for ease of access on the HP Content Manager System, 34,572 documents viewed and 22,890 items indexed by staff with access to the system in administration.

Research and Documentation Support

Staff of the ARMP continued to lend support to initiatives/requirements for various projects and programmes that arose in departments.

Outreach and Education

The ARMP continued to lend support to The UWI and the wider community. The ARMP assisted with the salvaging of archival documents from the burnt-out repository at the Barbados Department of Archives which was ravaged by fire on June 18, 2024. The Campus Records Manager/Head Archivist along with heritage professionals from UNESCO and the Barbados Museum and Historical Society rendered assistance in the area of cultural first aid. The salvage/recovery process is still ongoing. The Archives Assistant was one of 14 participants worldwide to be granted a scholarship to attend a workshop entitled

"Global Archive Community in the Digital Age: Challenges and Opportunities" under the auspices of the Shanghai University and the International Council on Archives in July 2024. In October 2023, the Archives had a visit from the UWI Students Today Alumni Tomorrow (STAT) Cave Hill Chapter.

Tribute

The Department paid tribute to the late Sir Neville Nicholls, former Chair of Cave Hill Campus Council. Virtual and physical displays were created for the viewing held in the Hilary McDonald Beckles Administration Complex, where Sir Neville laid in state. Pictures commemorating the life and times of Sir Neville were on display for his family and the campus community to view.

CAMPUS IT SERVICES (CITS) CHAMPIONING MODERNISATION AND EFFICIENCY

Campus Enterprise Software Modernisation Project

In December of 2023, the Campus entered an agreement with Ellucian to modernise the Campus' enterprise software platform. CITS is actively supporting the campus in a comprehensive modernisation project, aimed at upgrading infrastructure and enhancing overall efficiency. This will involve the transition to a single, SaaS-based ERP system, which will streamline operations and improve data management across the campus.

The major modernisation effort includes a number of new Ellucian Banner solutions. Table 4 highlights the major solutions to be delivered.

Spotlight on Reporting

The Enterprise System team dedicated time to focus on enhancing Campus reporting capabilities. They are well advanced in delivering dashboards for each major cycle of the Campus – Applications, Registration and Graduation. These dashboards provide reports on a semester basis, but also provide 5-year trends. The lead members on this initiative are Arthur Williams and Amilton Wilson.

A New Portal for Cave Hill





Modern Recruitment & Application Solution In Train

The ESSU Team worked on several long-term engagements this year. One which will be launching in the 2024-25 academic year is a new recruitment and application solution. This tool aims to empower the Campus' efforts to expand its reach and to optimise its recruitment and application processes. Overall, this modern and feature rich solution is intended to provide a positive experience for prospects, applicants and future students.

Network Services – Impact on Multiple Fronts

The Network Services' network engineering team, partnered with local service providers, Promotech, FLOW and Digicel, as well as international cybersecurity company Fortinet to provide wireless and wired connectivity for the Inter-American Court of Human Rights 166th session and public hearing of the Advisory Opinion on Climate Emergency and Human Rights held in Barbados during the period of April 22 to April 26. The event included live streaming, language translation and special connection requirements for the judges, court officers, representatives from 36 States and public institutions, 17 indigenous communities, more than 90 NGOs and think tanks, 70 academic institutions, and 45 special experts. The team created a network operations centre for managing the event.

LAUNCH OF NEW WEBSITES





IMPACTFUL DIGITAL SOLUTIONS

The Digital Solutions team, Network Services, created a number of useful applications to meet the digital needs of the Campus over the year. Examples included the staff account status checker to be used by the HR department and CETL for verifying the login status of users; the Third Party Identity Service for checking and correcting Third-party IDs in Banner to ensure unique user account and email creation; the Staff Password Reset Tool; and development of a departmental portal for INPLAIS that brings all of their services into one interface. This team is focused on delivering low and no code solutions to address the low-hanging innovations that are made available with the tools available in the Office 365 solution suite.

New Features and Updates Lead to Improved Websites

Apart from the launch of some new websites of various Campus Units, the websites of other Units underwent changes to improve their functionality.

Sidney Martin Library

A variety of updates were made to the Library's website. These updates included notices of events and closures, links to resources and the corrections of errors. Discussions regarding further updates,

and the possibilities of redesigning the website commenced and are still ongoing.

Shridath Ramphal Centre for International Trade Law, Policy and Services (SRC)

The website's content is arranged to highlight the Centre's three core areas of focus: trade policy training, research and outreach. This year, the SRC launched the SRC Caribbean Shipping Lanes Webpage, which is a go-to hub for all information relating to ongoing negotiations at the International Maritime Organization, with which CARICOM Member States are involved. The website reflects the SRC's commitment to advising and providing technical support on shipping and logistics to and out of the region.

OSSD Website Vital to Provision of Career Development Information

The website is a vital tool that increases access to career development information beyond individual coaching and group coaching. The Career Counselling Specialist with the assistance of the Campus Web Team prepared updates to the site including those used for the World of Work events.

The introduction of the use of Microsoft Forms to register for career events and workshops greatly assisted in reducing administrative strain on the Career Counselling Specialist. This strategy will be maintained

in the new academic year. Conversations are ongoing with the Web Team to identify solutions to automate placement requests and maintain recruiter and student profiles.

Student Enrolment and Retention Unit (SERU) Updates New Student Website

The SERU updated the New Student Website to ensure early access to important information for incoming students and updated the general Student Handbook and the Pre-arrival Guide for Regional and International Students. Recognising that the information needs of postgraduate students merited a separate pre-arrival guide, the SERU introduced a Pre-arrival Guide for Regional and International Postgraduate Students. The Unit also updated the various online Fees Booklets for regional undergraduate and graduate students, as well as international students. The updating of these resources was coordinated by the Administrative Assistant/Coordinator Student Engagement and Retention.

Greater Efficiency Through Smart Initiatives

A New Tracking System for Internships Impending

A new digital tracking system for internships is in the pipeline and is being developed to enable real-time monitoring of placements, student progress, and feedback. This system integrates with career services and will allow the Office of Student Services and Development (OSSD) to enhance internship programs based on the collected data and to improve overall efficiency in managing and optimising these opportunities.

Launch of Cave Hill's Shuttle Tracker App

During the month of March, 2024, the Cave Hill Campus was proud to introduce the Shuttle Tracker App which was designed to enhance the transportation experience of students who commute 'to and fro' using the campus shuttles. The app, which was developed in-house by Mr David Marshall, Coordinator of the Smart Campus Initiative, allows students to view the real-time location of the student shuttles, making it easier to track their arrival and departure.

The app uses Microsoft's Power Apps platform, which

must first be downloaded from the app store or Google Play Store (Power Apps by Microsoft). After using their mycavehill credentials to access the system, students are able to view the real-time location of the shuttle via the app.

THE STUDENT EXPERIENCE TEAM (SXT) ELEVATES SERVICE EXCELLENCE

Expansion of PULSE (Positioning UWI to Lead through Service Excellence) Points Programme

The Student Experience Team (SXT), Office of Institutional Planning and Infrastructural Services (INPLAIS) expanded the Campus' PULSE programme in 2023-24. In addition to completing updates to the PULSE website (www.cavehill.uwi.edu/PULSE) and logo, including new formats for the PULSE Points employee recognition programme and PULSE Pointers customer suggestion scheme, SXT coordinated a pilot of the Campus' new 'PULSE Check' mystery shopping programme. This programme allows student volunteers (PULSE Checkers) to earn rewards by completing mystery shopping assignments at Campus units. PULSE Checkers report on the extent to which departments have been meeting

the Campus' Customer Service Standards, which were adopted in August 2023. Feedback from the pilot allowed Heads of six participating departments to commend staff for consistently meeting standards and identify opportunities to enhance service quality, including through training, policy changes or process improvement. SXT also coordinated the award of 25 PULSE Points to employees who went beyond the call of duty during the year. Among this group, the Campus was pleased to recognise Mrs Therese James of the Department of Government, Sociology, Social Work & Psychology, whose three nominations earned her the PULSE Points Annual Award.



TEACHING, LEARNING AND STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

During the 2023-2024 academic year the Campus remained committed to a holistic approach to teaching, learning, and student development, ensuring that students received comprehensive support. Curriculum renewal remained a key priority, keeping academic programmes relevant, innovative, and aligned with industry trends. These continuous updates enhanced the learning experience, equipping students with the critical knowledge and skills needed in an evolving world. Internship programmes further complemented academic instruction by providing valuable real-world exposure. Through these initiatives - along with mentorship, co-curricular engagement, and student well-being support - the Campus fostered an environment where students could grow intellectually, professionally, and personally.

The Campus recognises that a well-rounded academic environment depends not only on what happens in the classroom but also on the support structures that enhance teaching and learning. Several key units play an instrumental role in this regard, including the Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning (CETL), which advances pedagogical innovation and faculty development; the Office of Student Services and Development (OSSD), which fosters student engagement and co-curricular growth; the Libraries, which provide access to invaluable academic resources; the Student Enrolment and Retention Unit (SERU), which facilitates access and retention initiatives, expanding opportunities for students to succeed; and Campus Information Technology Services (CITS), which plays a crucial role in maintaining and advancing the Campus' digital learning environment. Their collective efforts enrich the student-centred experience, ensuring students have the resources and support needed to thrive.

Quality Assurance and Curriculum Renewal

With a continued focus on programme quality, rigorous monitoring of faculties, departments and disciplines was undertaken under the guidance of the Quality Assurance Office, ensuring effective Quality Assurance Reviews. The Academic Quality Assurance Committee (AQAC), a subcommittee of the Academic Board, remained committed to diligently evaluating proposals for new and revised undergraduate courses and programmes before their submission to the Academic Board for Campus approval. After receiving Campus approval, undergraduate proposals were then forwarded to the Board for Undergraduate Studies (BUS) for final approval. Similarly, the Campus Committee for Graduate Studies and Research (CCGSR), a subcommittee of the Board for Graduate Studies and Research, played a key role in overseeing the approval of new and revised postgraduate courses and programmes.

Student Experience Team (SXT), Office of Institutional Planning and Infrastructural Service (INPLAIS), Supporting Programme Development and Renewal

In October 2023, on behalf of the Faculty of Medical Sciences, the Student Experience Team conducted market research to inform the development of a proposed Master of Science/Postgraduate Diploma in Infectious Disease. Final year Medical Sciences students and healthcare practitioners in Barbados and the Caribbean region completed an online survey, providing valuable insight into their educational and professional backgrounds, levels of interest in the proposed programme and preferences for programme delivery.

In support of the Faculty of Science & Technology's proposed offer of a new Minor in Sustainable Energy Management, SXT administered a survey of undergraduate students in the Faculties of Science & Technology and Social Sciences. Between March and

April 2024, 319 students participated in the 'Majors & Minors Poll 2024', with the results suggesting significant interest in the proposed Minor across both Faculties.

Supporting Enhancement of The Student Experience

SXT undertook routine assessments of students' learning and service experience, including the annual Orientation Review (August 2023) and 'World of Work' Job Fair Review (March 2024) on behalf of the Office of Student Services & Development (OSSD). Feedback from new undergraduate students and Fair attendees and exhibitors allowed OSSD to plan enhancements to orientation and career-building resources and activities for students, respectively. OSSD also requested support with the administration of a 'Work Experience Poll' to develop insight into the extent and nature of students' participation in a range of employment and voluntary activities. The Poll was conducted in November 2023. Among 661 respondents, 87% had some form of work experience in the previous year, with 49% citing jobs/employment and 30% having

done voluntary work/service. These and other findings informed OSSD's career development programming during 2023-24.

In February 2024, SXT also supported OSSD and the Faculty of Medical Sciences in administering a survey to assess the mental wellbeing support needs of students on clinical programmes based at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital. This study informed the introduction of a new psychological counselling service at the Errol Walrond Building, Clinical Skills Complex.

In Semester 2, INPLAIS undertook a comprehensive Classroom Satisfaction Review to gather feedback from students and faculty on their experiences, needs and preferences in relation to teaching and learning spaces, teaching technology and technical support. SXT administered two surveys – the Learning Spaces Poll for students and the Classroom Satisfaction Survey for staff. Most students and staff respondents reported overall satisfaction with classrooms and study rooms, and with room elements such as location/accessibility, seating configuration and acoustics. Based on the research, INPLAIS identified priority rooms for upgrades related to technology/ equipment, ventilation and air temperature.

CURRICULUM EVOLUTION ACROSS FACULTIES

Faculty of Law Advances Implementation of New Double Degree Programmes

During the 2023/24 academic year, the Faculty of Law took significant steps in operationalising its new double degree programmes. These include the LLM in Corporate and Commercial Law or Intellectual Property Law from the Cave Hill Campus, paired with an LLM in American and Transnational Law from the University of Dayton in the United States, as well as a double degree in Corporate Commercial Law and International Economic Law in collaboration with Leuphana University in Germany.

To strengthen engagement and provide insights into the programme, the Deputy Dean for Graduate Studies and Research met with students at Leuphana University on January 11, 2024, outlining the Faculty's double degree offerings and highlighting the benefits of studying at the Cave Hill Campus.

As of the end of the 2023/24 academic year, the Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) for these programmes were in the final stages of review by the Campus' attorneys, marking a crucial step toward full implementation.

Faculty of Medical Sciences Implements Unified Final Exit Examination for MB BS Programme

The Faculty of Medical Sciences undertook a significant curriculum update with the implementation of a unified final exit examination for the MB BS programme. This new format, first executed in June 2024, aligns with best practices from leading global medical institutions. By integrating assessments in core medical disciplines - Surgery, Medicine and Therapeutics, and Obstetrics and Gynecology - into a single, comprehensive evaluation, the unified examination ensures a more cohesive assessment

of graduating students' medical competencies. The unified examination reduces logistical costs associated with separate examinations and offers a streamlined, cohesive evaluation of medical competencies for graduating students.

Prior to the inaugural staging of the unified examination, the Faculties of Medial Sciences across
The UWI and the School of Clinical Medicine and Research in Nassau, Bahamas conducted a Mock Unified Examination. The new unified format includes four 2-hour written papers and an Objective Structured Clinical Exam (OSCE) with 17 active stations inclusive of one medical ethics station. The MB BS regulations were also revised to enhance harmonisation across the teaching sites of the Faculty of Medical Sciences and to implement the new format of the exam.

Faculty of Social Sciences Prioritises Institutional Development

The Faculty of Social Sciences continued to position itself as a leader in education, research, and public engagement. This academic year, significant progress was made in institutional development, strengthening both academic infrastructure and external partnerships to enhance teaching, learning, and research outcomes.

One of the key areas of focus has been the expansion of interdisciplinary programmes that reflect the evolving demands of the global job market. New programmes in digital transformation, public policy, and environmental economics are being developed to provide students with relevant skills that address contemporary social and economic challenges. In addition, the Faculty is working towards strengthening its online and blended learning offerings to increase accessibility to higher education for students across the Caribbean.

Infrastructure upgrades have been prioritised, with plans in place to modernise classrooms and research facilities. Smart classrooms equipped with the latest technology are being introduced to enhance interactive learning experiences. Additionally, investments in research centres will allow for more collaborative research projects that address pressing regional and global issues.

Industry-Aligned Postgraduate Programme Offerings by the Department of Management Studies

Over the 2023-2024 academic year, the Department of Management Studies (DOMS) developed programmes by identifying key skills and knowledge gaps in the business industry. Additionally, DOMS reviewed and enhanced its offerings to integrate a deeper understanding of sustainability and its practical applications. Students were encouraged to engage in pioneering research with a strong emphasis on real-world impact, fostering a new generation of forwardthinking graduates. Sustainability remained a central priority, shaping all aspects of the Department's work, from teaching and research to daily operations. Through this commitment, DOMS aimed to inspire innovation and drive meaningful change within the business environment.

To further strengthen its offerings, the Department introduced new courses with sustainability embedded in the curriculum. These included MBAs in Cybersecurity, Artificial Intelligence, Data Analytics, Energy Business, Sustainable Procurement, Logistics and Supply Chain Management, Sustainability Management, and Finance. Additionally, DOMS launched new Master of Science degrees in Aviation and Airline Business Analytics with a Commercial Pilot License, Aviation Management with a Commercial Pilot License, and Energy, Trade and Finance.

Enhancing Learning Through Performance and Artistic Research

The Theatre programme in the Faculty of Culture, Creative and Performing Arts continued its partnership with the Faculty of Medical Sciences in October 2023, presenting *Theatre in Health Education*. As simulated patients, student actors participated in an emergency medical simulation, gaining valuable hands-on experience in applied theatre within a medical training environment.

Students enrolled in the Capstone Thesis/Project class were given the opportunity to hear directly from creative practitioners through 'The Praxis' a series conceptualised and organised by Dr Rainy Demerson. The inaugural sessions featured presentations by lecturers, Dr Rainy Demerson, Ms Lisa Cumberbatch, Mr Russell Watson, and Dr Stefan Walcott who shared insights on their artistic research. 'The Praxis' is intended to give students, particularly those enrolled in the Capstone Thesis/Project course, an idea of the academic research that fuels art making and provide an understanding of what artistic research entails. It was described as an inspirational event for the Capstone students and also an opportunity for them to witness the work that their lecturers do outside the classroom.

During Semester 2, 16 final year students presented their Capstone productions before a public audience. This cohort included four students in Dance, four in Music, three in Theatre, and five in Film, showcasing their creative and academic development through impactful performances and projects.

Revitalising Labs and Classrooms Through Science Fee Allocations

During the year under review, the Department of Computer Science, Mathematics, and Physics (CMP) utilised funds from the Science Fees paid by students to enhance student facilities and upgrade equipment. This fee, set at BBD 150 and payable by all Faculty of Science and Technology (FST) undergraduate students, was introduced in the 2022-23 academic year to support the procurement and maintenance of scientific assets. Prior to its implementation, limited financial resources often made such improvements challenging.

Improvements in the 2023/24 Academic Year by Discipline

The following upgrades and enhancements were made across CMP disciplines using funds from the Science Fee:

Mathematics

- Crowdmark, an online grading and analytics platform, was introduced to streamline the evaluation of handwritten student work, particularly for paper-based face-to-face midterm tests. This platform enables more efficient grading and richer, more consistent feedback for students.
- CoCalc and GeoGebra were integrated to support students in Preliminary Mathematics and Real Mathematics courses, enhancing their learning experience.

Electronics and Physics

Several essential pieces of equipment were procured, including the POWEROWL 16 Bay AA AAA Battery Charger, AAA Rechargeable Batteries, Longwei Low Frequency Audio Signal Generator, SScon 10 pc 5K Breadboard Trim Potentiometer, UCTRONICS Ultimate Starter Kits for Arduino, 2-in-1 Oscilloscope Multi-meter Colour Screen, SLOTTED OPTO-INTERRUPTER (4-PIN 3MM GAP, 50mA (If) 30V (Vce) 20mA(I) Photointerrupt, DIODE RECTIFIER SCR (4A @ 400V), REVERSE BLOCK THYRISTOR (TO-

225AA SCR Rectifier), TRIPLE 3-INPUT NOR GATE, IC MC7805CK (5V @ 1A Positive Voltage Regulator, TO-3 LM340K-5), Ohaus NVE612 Balance (610g 0.01g), Bulb Holder, Boyle's Law Horizontal Mount, and Stuart Ceramic Coated Hotplate UC150.

- New Dell computers were purchased for the Embedded Systems Lab, replacing systems that predated 2010.
- Facility upgrades included the painting and refurbishment of the Physics Labs, which had not been refurbished since prior to 2005.

Computer Science

- New Dell computers were purchased for Computer Science Lab 1 and Computer Science Lab 2, replacing systems that were originally acquired between 2008 and 2012.
- Facility enhancements included the painting and refurbishment of Computer Science Lab 1 and Computer Science Lab 2, which had last been upgraded prior to 2005.

These improvements reflect a significant investment in upgrading student learning environments, ensuring access to modern resources and enhanced facilities.

EXPANDING OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH INTERNSHIP PROGRAMMES

Internships remain a crucial component of the Campus' commitment to experiential learning, providing students with practical, hands-on experience that bridges the gap between academic knowledge and professional application. Through structured internship placements, mentorship, and industry collaborations, students gain valuable insights, real-world skills, and professional exposure, enhancing their readiness for the evolving job market.

Improving Internship Coordination Through a Digital Tracking System

A new digital tracking system for internships is currently in development to enable real-time monitoring of placements, student progress, and feedback. This system will integrate with career services, allowing for data-driven enhancements to internship programmes, while improving efficiency in managing and optimising these opportunities.

Ongoing discussions with Deans, Heads, and faculty aim to support students in identifying and planning for discipline-specific experiential opportunities. Additionally, the expansion of internship courses offers students greater flexibility to participate in internships while balancing academic commitments. With the support of the Office of the Deputy Principal, an audit of experiential courses across Faculties was conducted this year to further strengthen these initiatives.

Expanding Recruitment Opportunities for Students

Throughout the year numerous opportunities were provided to share recruitment prospects with students. However, tracking the exact number of placements after resumes are shared has become increasingly challenging. What remains clear is

the growing outreach from a variety of companies seeking to identify talent among Cave Hill students and alumni.

Over the academic year, new recruitment partners continued to engage with the OSSD to offer experiential learning opportunities, particularly in high-demand fields such as IT and business analytics. Accounting saw the highest demand, followed by computer science, human resources, law, and marketing. In contrast, opportunities in science, human relations, and international relations remained more limited due to the structured recruiting cycles in these fields. Additionally, the National Give Back Programme has expanded opportunities for students to develop civic engagement and career readiness skills while supporting elements of the United Nations Sustainability Goals.

Internship Opportunities in the 2023/2024 Academic Year

During the 2023/2024 academic year, students accessed a variety of internship opportunities through placements coordinated by Faculties and Departments. The following is a summary of the organisations that provided internships and the number of students who benefited.

SRC Students Participate in Global Joint University Study Tour

The Shridath Ramphal Centre's (SRC) Masters in International Trade Policy (MITP) students once again participated in the Joint University Study Tour (JUST), which took place from June 6–23, 2024, marking the second year of the initiative. This global academic programme is designed to provide students with firsthand exposure to international trade policy, economic diplomacy, and global governance. The 2024 tour was held in Geneva, Switzerland, a key hub for international trade and policy, and brought together students from various universities worldwide.

For the first half of the tour (June 10–14, 2024), students from different universities across the globe joined MITP participants, fostering cross-cultural exchange, collaboration, and experiential learning in critical areas of international trade and policy. A total of 12 students and three alumni from CARICOM countries, along with approximately 88 students from Canada, Europe, and the Graduate Institute (Geneva), took part in the programme under the guidance of 11 supervisors.

Practical Training for Human Nutrition and Dietetics Students

During the academic year, three students enrolled in the BSc Human Nutrition and Dietetics programme completed four-week (160-hour) rotations in Food Service at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital (QEH) site.

Additionally, seven students gained hands-on experience in public health and community-based nutrition services by completing eight-week (320-hour) rotations in Community Nutrition at various sites. These included the Heart and Stroke Foundation, Hypertension and Diabetes Association, Diabetes Foundation, and several educational institutions such as The Lodge School, Ellerslie Secondary School, Princess Margaret Secondary School, Christ Church Foundation School, Roland Edwards Primary School, Mount Tabor Primary School, and Bailey's Primary School. Students

also participated in the National Nutrition Centre Summer Camp and completed rotations at the Maurice Byer, Winston Scott, St John, and St Philip Polyclinics.

CMP Students Secure Prestigious Microsoft Internships

This academic year, three outstanding students from the Department of Computer Science, Mathematics, and Physics (CMP) secured highly competitive internships at the Microsoft headquarters in Redmond, Washington, for Summer 2024.

This achievement was made possible through CMP's partnership with David Fowler, along with a dedicated team from Microsoft headquarters, including Russel Hercules and Maia Cave, all Caribbean natives committed to supporting local youth. Through the Microsoft-UWI Cave Hill Mentorship Ring, this team of mentors guided the students through a rigorous technical interview preparation process, culminating in this milestone as the department's first Microsoft interns.

OFFICE OF STUDENT SERVICES AND DEVELOPMENT

The Office of Student Services and Development (OSSD), continues to provide an array of services that support student success and development, and works collaboratively with several partners across campus and external stakeholders to provide a range of health and wellness, academic support, professional and personal development initiatives that facilitate student success. Its role is to ensure that students learn in the affective domain and make use of the out-of-class learning experiences that help them develop and grow, engage in active citizenship and commit to lifelong learning.

Expanded Services for Students with Disabilities

Intentional strides were made to enhance access for students with blindness and other disabilities. Specifically, OSSD introduced proctoring for exams and provided trained scribes for students with blindness, addressing their unique needs and ensuring they can fully participate in assessments.

In April 2024, the department procured two new computers dedicated for use by students with disabilities. This dedicated resource serves multiple purposes, including test taking and note taking. Ultimately, the provision of campus-owned devices would maintain the integrity of the assessment process and ensure that students with disabilities are able to complete their examinations fairly. The process is currently ongoing to secure licenses for assistive technologies (e.g. Job Access With Speech (JAWS)), which will offer critical support and accessibility features tailored to the needs of students with blindness. These proactive measures are designed to create an inclusive environment, guaranteeing that all students have equitable access to educational opportunities.

Activities to Promote Inclusivity, Student Engagement and Enable Wider Access

Disability Services Coordination

The Disability Services Coordinator (DSC) Mr Khaleid Holder worked with Mr Troy Carrington of Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning (CETL) and instructors of students with blindness to identify the learning accommodations needs of the students and to identify ways that teaching and learning could be enhanced for this group of students. Mr Holder also supported Mr Carrington and instructors of the students with blindness in midterm assessment preparations and administration, where needed. The DSC continued to coordinate academic advisement sessions and course registrations for the students with blindness. Additionally, the department coordinated one-on-one meetings with two instructors of students with blindness to enhance the accessibility of their courses. The department also coordinated a walk-through of two of the halls of residence in preparation to welcome an incoming student with physical disability on exchange to the Campus.

Academic Support Clinic

The Academic Support Clinic was provided during Semesters 1 and 2, offering learners personalised academic coaching through individual consultations tailored to their specific needs while aimed at fostering their success. One hundred and twenty-six (126) appointments were made during the period. The majority of students who accessed the Academic Support Clinic requested guidance with study skills and/or time management. It was observed that while some students seeking assistance with study skills did not require support with time management, all students requesting help with time management also benefited from advice on effective study strategies.

Teaching, Learning and Student Development

Working to Enhance Communication and Accessibility to Resources Available to Students

Disability Services

- 1. Collaboration with Faculty for Accessibility: In partnership with the Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning, the department facilitated sessions to assist faculty in ensuring that teaching resources such as lecture notes and reading materials were available to students with disabilities in accessible formats.
- 2. Transcription of Documents: To address instances where class materials were not accessible (readable by JAWS, the screen reader software used by students with blindness), the department facilitated the transcription of these documents into accessible formats.
- 3. Provision of Computers with Assistive
 Technology: The department procured two
 laptop devices and is currently equipping
 them with assistive technologies to enhance
 accessibility for students with disabilities.
 These devices will be available for student use
 while on campus.
- 4. Proctoring Exams: To support faculty in accommodating students who require learning adjustments, the department provided proctoring services for some of the midterm assessments. This ensures equity in access to students.
- 5. Strengthening support to students with disabilities: The department organised sessions for student peer volunteers to prepare them to read descriptively for students with blindness. This initiative aims to improve the learning experience by ensuring that complex visual information is conveyed effectively.

This initiative, designed to enhance career readiness and professional confidence, was made possible through partnerships with

Empowering Students Through Mentorship and Professional Development

Based on valuable feedback from student mentors, a series of promotional and professional development initiatives were introduced to support students beyond their academic journey. This initiative included a mentorship talk on resilience, the screening of mentorship videos, a communications workshop, and a mentorship corner during the Annual Job Fair, all aimed at equipping students with essential career and life skills.

The Resilience & Career Readiness conversations were led by Mr Adrian Green, while the Communications Workshop was facilitated by Toastmaster, Ms Sophia Skeete, equipping students with skills to refine their public speaking and professional communication.

Students Explore Career Opportunities at Job Fair

The annual Job Fair welcomed nearly 40 exhibitors, providing students with valuable opportunities to explore career pathways and connect with potential employers. Featured exhibitors included Deloitte, Ernst & Young, Gildan, KPMG, National Transformation initiative, PwC, and Sagicor.

This year also saw the participation of several first-time exhibitors, including CG United Insurance, Nexa, Bayview Laboratory, Pan-American International Insurance Corporation, Grant Thornton, The Barbados Employment and Career Centre, Kadrow HR, Roberts Manufacturing Co Ltd, Startwise Barbados, and G4S Security Solutions. Nearly 200 students registered at the OSSD Secretariat, engaging with employers and learning about various career opportunities, including the Sagicor Young Professional Programme, as well as internships at CIBC Caribbean and Gildan.

CENTRE FOR EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING AND LEARNING: ADVANCING FACULTY DEVELOPMENT FOR HIGHER LEARNING OUTCOMES

Guided by its slogan, "Academic Excellence Through Quality Teaching," The Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning (CETL) continued to deliver its flagship professional certification programme, the Postgraduate Certificate in University Teaching and Learning (PgCUTL) in the year under review. Additionally, CETL offered a range of professional development initiatives, including workshops, seminars/webinars, individual and group consultations, and actively participated in the quality assurance process. The Centre also provided educational technology services and teaching and learning resources to support faculty development and instructional excellence.


As Artificial Intelligence gains prominence on the landscape of education, CETL continued to spear-head training and development initiatives in artificial intelligence for teaching, learning and productivity at the Cave Hill Campus. To this end, workshops were conducted for academic and administrative staff. One was entitled *Using Artificial Intelligence to Boost Productivity*.


A second workshop addressed the topic Artificial Intelligence as a Companion in the Classroom and was customised for the Department of Language, Linguistics and Literature.

The Educational Technologist partnered with Dr Jacqueline Wiltshire, Legal Consultant to the Government of Barbados on social legislation, to present on Al and Implications for Social Policy and Planning in the Commonwealth Caribbean.

Developing Resources to Support High-Quality Teaching

To ensure that faculty have access to up-to-date resources, CETL disseminated a variety of videos, research papers, ebooks, webinars and articles weekly. Resource material from the Monday Morning Mentor Online series and Faculty Focus were disseminated to academic staff and shared with CETLs at UWI Mona and St Augustine. Some titles included: How Can I Use AI to Draft Course Materials?; What Are 14 Strategies





to Take My Teaching Career from Good to Great?; How Can I Create Assessments to Effectively Measure Student Learning?; How Do I Start Using Virtual Reality as a Tool for Instruction?; Integrating Guest Speakers and Panelists in Online Courses; How Can I Introduce Creativity to My Classes to Build Connection with Students?

Improvement of Operations and **Efficiencies**

Customer Service Framework

The CETL Framework for Developing Customer Service Standards continued to guide how CETL interacts with its clients and partners. The framework focuses on the following areas:

- Attentiveness to provide a productive, safe, appealing physical and virtual space for the conduct of CETL business.
- Efficiency to make faculty development needs a priority.
- Courtesy to respond to requests within a reasonable timeframe through diverse channels of communications.

Faculty Consultations

Faculty continued to benefit from individual and group consultations with CETL officers utilizing ZOOM, Teams or Office Bookings. Some areas of consultation during the reporting period included: Course design, teaching strategies and methods, Moodle gradebook configuration and management, online assessment, eLearning site navigation, course setup and layout, quiz bank management, quiz setup and implementation, group management, restrictions, content gamification, assessment, course design, portfolio development, rubrics, table of specifications, and content creation and transfer. A Faculty Drop-In Clinic remained available to allow faculty the opportunity to post questions and queries on any technology offered within the teaching and learning space.

CETL Dashboard

The CETL Professional Services account utilised Microsoft Power BI to upkeep the CETL Operations At-A-Glance dashboard. The dashboard makes available the activities performed by CETL.

Operating Efficiencies – Enhancing Service to Faculties/ Departments/Units

In order to sustain efficiencies between CETL and Faculties, CETL continued to provide a Faculty Representative model. This arrangement assigns a specific CETL officer to each Faculty/Institute and engenders a collaborative and prescriptive approach to meeting pedagogical and technical needs. Faculties are encouraged to, where necessary, reach out to the officer assigned for a more personalised response.

Graduation

The annual Graduation Ceremonies were held on October 21, 2023 and the Campus was pleased to award degrees to 1,247 students who had successfully completed their programmes of study. At the undergraduate level, 875 students were conferred with degrees and diplomas, and at the postgraduate level, 372 students were conferred with degrees, diplomas and certificates.

Faculty Scholarships and Science Fee Grants Awarded

Students Capture Gold at 2024 Math Olympiad

Team Psi-Kicks, consisting of three students from the Faculty of Science and Technology at Cave Hill Campus - Simeon Green, Ian Francis, and Tyreke Jones - were awarded the 2024 Gold Medal in the Math Olympiad at the Caribbean Science Foundation's second annual Caribbean Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Olympiads, held virtually from January 17-20, 2024. The Olympiads featured competition in three categories: Math Olympiad, Computer Coding Olympiad, and Robotics Olympiad, across three age levels: 12-15, 16-18, and 19-21. During the programme, Mr Sokaloo conducted research in Dr Chris Shoemaker's laboratory at the Geisel School of Medicine's Department of Biochemistry and Cell Biology, focusing on elucidating the role of NBR1 (Neighbour of BRCA1 gene 1) in autophagy.

This initiative was designed to assess the prevalence of homelessness across Barbados. For one night, the students were tasked with the collection of geospatial locations of homeless hotspots and counting and surveying homeless persons. The students were successful in collecting the necessary data needed for the duration of the project. The purpose of this initiative was to gather data related to the locations and profile of homeless persons. This information was used to design the *National Policy to address Homelessness in Barbados*.

Additionally, Business Analytics students were tasked with designing a fraud detection system for Sagicor Life Insurance Company. The students used data analytic techniques and tools to develop the fraud detection system which would be used to identify fraudulent claims. This system has proven to be effective in determining the level of fraudulent activity across the various islands where Sagicor operates. Business Analytics students also collected data for the Product Audit project in collaboration with the Barbados Tourism Marketing Inc (BTMI). For this project, students geotagged all of the tourism products in Barbados to facilitate their geospatial representation in the BTMI's system. They also completed assessments of the tourism products and surveys with tourists on-site as part of the evaluation.

CAMPUS RESEARCH AWARDS

In the Academic year 2023/2024, the Cave Hill Campus funded research by its students to the tune of BBD 155,217.85 The greatest percentage (46%) of these awards was captured by the Faculty of Humanities and **Education**. The Faculty of Medical Sciences captured 23 %, with the Faculty of Science and Technology receiving 17% and the Faculty of Social Sciences obtaining 9%. The Faculty of Culture, Creative and Performing Arts and The Faculty of Law captured very small shares, having obtained 3% and 2% respectively. The details are reflected in Table 10.

OFFICE OF RESEARCH, INNOVATION AND COMMUNITY AT CAVE HILL (RICCH)

Sargassum Alginate Extraction Project

The Campus undertook an initiative that sought to extract Alginate from Sargassum Seaweed. Alginate, also known as alginic acid or algin, is a hydrocolloid, water-soluble biopolymer found in the cell walls of brown algae or seaweed, often in a gel state. The extraction of Alginate is taking place in various countries, with the product being used for various consumables. The yield from the extraction process can be quite low. An innovative process to extract a high yield of Alginate from Sargassum seaweed has been developed by Dr Srinivasa Popuri (Senior Lecturer, Department of Biological and Chemical Sciences), alongside Keane Mason and their research team. The Campus teamed up with Diproinduca, an international company that specialises in by-product

management and alternative raw materials production to commercialise this process. Pilot Testing of the process was successfully conducted during this period.

The Renewable Energy powered Silent Terminator (REST) prototype

During the reporting period, testing of the REST Prototype was undertaken. The REST device, an innovation of the Centre for Biosecurity (CBS) team, is designed to attract and kill flying, biting insects powered by green energy and without the use of harmful toxic chemicals (insecticides). The aim is to reduce the number of mosquitos, potential infections, diseases, insecticide resistance in flying biting insects and air pollution. This in turn should lead to and a cleaner healthier environment and less harmful climate impact. The device selectively targets female flying biting insects within an external environment while utilising green renewable energy. The first prototype was completed, received and initially tested at The UWI, Cave Hill in February 2024. Improvements were then made to the design following which further testing will be conducted to evaluate its efficiency and

effectiveness at ArcTech Innovation, a spinoff company of London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (LSHTM) in the United Kingdom.

Short Course on Preparing Persuasive Grant Applications



Medicinal Cannabis - Inaugural Licence To Conduct Research And Development

The UWI, Cave Hill Campus was granted an inaugural license to conduct research and development into cannabis in Barbados by the Barbados Medicinal Cannabis Licensing Authority (BMCLA). The R&D licence enables the campus to conduct experiments and testing on various forms and derivatives of cannabis, including live plants, fresh and dried plant material, seeds, oil, and wax. The campus will also be able to pursue drug discovery and pharmacological research on cannabinoid compounds, such as phytocannabinoids, synthetic cannabinoids, endocannabinoids, and other related phytochemicals from the cannabis plant.

The licence was presented to Pro Vice-Chancellor and Campus Principal, Professor R Clive Landis by Chief Executive Officer of the Barbados Medicinal Cannabis Licensing Authority (BMCLA), Shanika Roberts-Odle during a ceremony held at the 3Ws Pavilion on January 19, 2024.

At an event held under the theme 'Licensed to Thrive', marking the third anniversary of the BMCLA, the presentation brought to 30, the number of licences approved by the BMCLA to participate in the marijuana industry.

Professor Landis told the audience that with the receipt of an R & D licence, Cave Hill is now poised to reap the benefits of applied research, and is also able to pursue entrepreneurial opportunities.

The Faculty of Medical Sciences plans to use the licence to research cardiometabolic syndrome, diseases affecting the central nervous system such as epilepsy, and the use of cannabinoid products to manage patients with related qualifying diseases which will lead to transformative medical interventions against NCDs and neurodegenerative conditions.

Dean of the Faculty of Medical Sciences, Dr Damian Cohall, will be at the forefront for the medicinal cannabis projects.

SUGAR ATLAS: Counter-Mapping Diabetes from the Caribbean

Project Summary: Public health is built on maps. But when it comes to diabetes in the Caribbean, many existing maps are alienating, incomplete, and full of errors. This creates double binds in mapping the most basic facts of what is happening to people. This project is envisioned as a collective attempt at counter-mapping diabetes care from the Caribbean. With a focus on making visible the planetary and embodied legacies of sugar - and highlighting the ways women are already mapping their own care - this research proposes a platform for unorthodox map-making and community art that recognizes people not as public health "risks" or targets, but as knowledge bearers offering insights from what they have learned by managing to hold up entire worlds.

FROM RESEARCH TO INNOVATION: A SARGASSUM SUCCESS STORY

Rum and Sargassum Pioneering Initiative

Initiated by Dr Legena Henry, a Lecturer in renewable energy at The UWI Cave Hill, the project focuses on converting sargassum seaweed and rum distillery wastewater into bio-compressed natural gas (bio-CNG). This initiative addresses the persistent issue of sargassum influxes on Caribbean coastlines by transforming an invasive seaweed into a valuable energy resource. The process involves anaerobic digestion, where sargassum, distillery effluent and Blackbelly sheep manure are combined to produce biomethane, which is then compressed to fuel vehicles. The project achieved a significant milestone in September 2024, with the launch of the world's first vehicle powered by bio-CNG derived from sargassum.

NEW INFRASTRUCTURE TO ADVANCE RESEARCH CAPABILITIES

Faculty of Medical Sciences (FMS) Launches a Multidisciplinary Dry Lab

On November 16, 2023, the FMS launched its Dry Lab in the Jacqueline Wade Conference Room in the Hilary McDonald Beckles Administration Building. Deputy Dean -Research and Postgraduate Studies, Dr Michael Campbell, was the Chair of the event. The Head of Department, Preclinical and Health Sciences, Dr Nkemcho Ojeh gave opening remarks and the Pro Vice-Chancellor and Principal, Professor R Clive Landis provided remarks on the use of the dry lab to conduct income generating research and other services to support the university's strategic plan underpinned by the theme, "Revenue Generation". The Dean gave comments on the dry lab's journey and vision and outlined its purpose, which is to serve as an area for modeling and the pursuit of other forms of analysis of non-wet derived data. The research themes to be considered in this space include nursing, applied public health, data analysis and management and ethics."

2024 Science and Technology Festival

The 2024 Science and Technology Festival was hosted by the Department of Science, Market Research and Innovation (SMRI) of the Ministry of Industry, Innovation, Science and Technology (MIST) in collaboration with the Faculty of Science and Technology (FST), The UWI Cave Hill Campus, from March 20-23, 2024 at the Lloyd Erskine Sandiford Centre (LESC) in Two Mile Hill, St. Michael, under the theme, "Let's Innovate: Barbados.

The festival featured interactive exhibits, workshops, demonstrations in robotics, coding, 3D printing, virtual reality, a Secondary Schools Speak-Off Competition and a Research Hub showcasing local scientific pursuits. The Science and Technology Hackathon encouraged participants to develop innovative solutions for real-world challenges.

Over 50 exhibitors, including local businesses, research institutions, and NGOs, presented cutting-edge technologies and digital advancements. Hundreds of students and teachers from primary to tertiary institutions visited the festival. It also received support from student volunteers from The UWI Cave Hill Campus, Barbados Community College, and local secondary schools. These volunteers assisted with event setup, guided attendees, and supported the interactive exhibits, significantly contributing to the event's success and fostering a greater appreciation for science and technology in Barbados.

Research and Innovation

Reptiles (CBER) project to examine soil samples from across Barbados via metabarcoding to detect DNA from critically endangered (and possibly extinct) endemic reptiles.

The project, in its initial stages, is part of an undergraduate research project with undergraduate student Kwame Adridge. The team is refining sample collection protocols and have designed DNA primers specific to the genes of the Barbados thread snake and the Barbados green anole and two invasive reptile species. The team is testing all collected soil samples for the presence of the target species, providing the Ministry of Environment with potential target location to focus field survey efforts. The final protocol will be used to collect soil samples from across Barbados. The team will then apply metabarcoding protocols to identify all reptiles that have left DNA traces, enabling the team to provide a detailed distribution map of endemic (and invasive) reptile species for the island.

Faculty of Social Sciences

A Partnership to Address Homelessness in Barbados

The Department of Management Studies (DOMS) engaged the Ministry of People Empowerment & Elder Affairs for the development of a National Policy to Address Homelessness in Barbados. This was a strategic shift towards an evidence-based, collaborative, and contemporary approach in addressing homelessness, acknowledging it as not just a reflection of poverty, but a complex social and public health challenge that disrupts lives and communities. As part of this, the Department conducted the first ever Point in Time (PIT) Count in Barbados. During the PIT Count, UWI students and volunteers from a variety of organisations went to various areas in Barbados to count the homeless. This facilitated the geospatial representation of hotspots of homelessness across the island and allowed for the collection of survey data which aided with the development of the policy.

Tourism and Hospitality Authority of Guyana (THAG) Seeks DOMS Expertise

The DOMS has developed a relationship with the Tourism and Hospitality Authority of Guyana (THAG)



with the aim to build out the tourism sector of Guyana through research and product development. Moreover, the Department will collaborate with THAG in areas of training through the development of joint programmes. One such programme is the Essentials in Tourism Management for which courses had already been developed.

Creation of a Comprehensive Inventory of Tourism Product Offerings in Barbados

The DOMS was engaged by the Barbados Tourism Marketing Inc. (BTMI) to provide a comprehensive inventory of the tourism product offerings in Barbados. This facilitated the development of new and innovative products through the identification of strengths and gaps. Thus, the report contributed to ensuring the competitiveness of the tourism product in Barbados.

Skilled Postgraduate Students Conduct Market Research on St. Joseph Hospital

Graduate students from the DOMS completed a report on the market potential of the St Joseph Hospital revitalisation project. Dr Joseann Knight from the Department supervised the process, helped designed research instruments, assisted with the conduct of the qualitative element of the research, supervised the data analysis and finalised the report. This report is the first step in a feasibility study to be conducted on the St Joseph Hospital.

George Alleyne Chronic Disease Research Centre (GA-CDRC)

Childhood Nutrition Surveillance Study Key in Assessing Child Nutrition in Barbados

The Childhood Nutrition Surveillance Study is a collaborative effort between The University of the West Indies, Cave Hill, Barbados, and the Shaw Centre for Paediatric Excellence, formed by The Government of Barbados and The Centre for Global Child Health at The Hospital for Sick Children (SickKids) in Toronto, Canada. Its aim is to assess the nutritional status of primary school-age children in Barbados and understand the factors influencing it.


The study, spearheaded by the George Alleyne Chronic Disease Research Centre at The University of the West Indies, Barbados, will focus on children aged 6-7 years and 8-9 years and will be conducted across public and private schools and polyclinics. It has received approval from the Ministry of Education, Technological and Vocational Training to commence, as well as ethical clearance from The University of the West Indies, Cave Hill/Barbados Ministry of Health Institutional Review Board.

Ultimately, the study hopes to establish a robust framework for the continual assessment of child nutrition in Barbados. It is a collective commitment to ensuring the optimal well-being of our nation's children.

Faculty of Humanities and Education

The Barbados Museum & Historical Society (BMHS) and the Department of History and Philosophy 'Uncover Newton' in their 2024 Lecture Series

From the mid-seventeenth to mid-eighteenth centuries, most of the Africans brought to Barbados and the English-speaking Caribbean came from the Gold and Windward Coasts and the Bight of Benin, which are now Ghana, Togo, Dahomey, and Western Nigeria. Between 1670 and 1833, approximately 1,000 enslaved individuals died on the Newton plantation, with an estimated 570 buried in the plantation's cemetery. Excavations of some of the burials have provided insights into their lives, including their



diets, religious practices, and burial customs. It is believed that 1.6 million Africans were brought to the Caribbean during the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade, with Barbados receiving between 350,000 and 380,000 enslaved Africans.

The Barbados Museum & Historical Society in collaboration with the Department of History and Philosophy of The University of the West Indies, proudly presented the 2024 Lecture Series themed: 'Newton Uncovered: Exploring the 21st Century Legacy of the Enslaved Burial Ground at Newton'.

There were seven (7) sessions with two (2) panel discussions involving UWI and overseas lecturers and regional experts on archaeology and cultural development. At least one (1) presentation was from a UWI History PhD student, Ms Stacia Bryan. Presentations focused on the history and archaeology of the sacred site of memory for the slave trade and slavery while also focusing on the communities who continue to use the site for spiritual purposes. The lecture series was also accompanied by a series of heritage tours to Newton and other sites associated with the themes in the series. Cultural presentations such as poetry

readings and film productions based on Newton were also showcased during the series.

The lecture series was proposed by Dr Tara Inniss who Chairs the BMHS Newton Subcommittee which was formed in August 2020. The Sub-committee centers the role of enslaved Africans in shaping Barbadian society, while also advising on the site's development and fundraising efforts.

Faculty of Law

Relaunch of the Caribbean Law Review

The Faculty's flagship publication, the Caribbean Law Review, was relaunched on April 25, 2024 after a 15-year hiatus with the publication of a June special issue on 'Unhealthy Food, Alcohol, Tobacco

and the Law'. The launch was conducted in a hybrid mode with authors, members of the Caribbean Law Review's Advisory Board and Editorial Committee as well as the Law and Health Research Unit (LHRU) partners attending in person and online. Remarks were made by Pro Vice-Chancellor and Principal, Professor R Clive Landis; Interim Dean of the Faculty, Dr Antonius Hippolyte; General Editor & Co-Editor of the Special Issue, Mrs Nicole Foster; Co-Editor of the special issue and Associate Director of Healthy Families Initiative, O'Neill Institute for National and Global Health Law, Georgetown University, Dr Isabel Barbosa; Lt Col Junior Browne, Officer-in-Charge of the Law Library and Mr Masoud Gerami, Managing Director, VLex.

Hosting of Prestigious Inter-American Court of Human Rights –166th Regular Session

The DOMS was honoured to host the 166th Regular Session of the Inter-American Court of Human Rights from April 22 - 26 2024, marking the first time this prestigious event was held in the Caribbean. This milestone underscores the Department's strategic commitment to supporting human rights and justice in the region. Hosting this session significantly elevated DOMS' profile and, by extension, that of The University of the West Indies, Cave Hill Campus. It reinforced the Department's position as a leading institution in the Caribbean, facilitating crucial discussions and collaborations on human rights issues and strengthening its position within the global academic and legal communities.

A First for Shridath Ramphal Centre (SRC) in organising World Trade Organization (WTO) Panel Discussion

The Shridath Ramphal Centre for International Trade, Law, Policy and Services (SRC) participated in the 2023 and 2024 World Trade Organization's Public Forum, with 2023 marking the first time the SRC organised a panel session at the event. The session titled "Small Island Developing States (SIDS) and Least Developed Countries (LDCs) as Laboratories for Advancing Green Trade", highlighted the progress made by SIDS and LDCs in developing green trade policies and explored the opportunities in these countries for designing, incubating, and implementing green, trade-related solutions to the climate crisis.

Dr Jan Yves Remy contributed to multiple trade and sustainability events at the WTO Public Forum, including speaking at an event entitled "Ten Quick Wins for Re-globalization & Green Trade Resilience," hosted by the TradeExperettes, and "Bridging the Gap: Equitable, Transparent, and Sustainable Instruments and Innovative Policies," hosted by the Geneva Graduate Institute. On the TradeExperettes Panel, Dr Remy explored critical green policy recommendations, including how international cooperation can secure sustainable and equitable production in global value chains and how knowledge transfer to developing

Cave Hill Staff Innovate - Innovate Competition 2024!

Innovate! The Cave Hill Campus New Venture Challenge, sponsored by The Office of Business Development at The University of the West Indies (UWI) Cave Hill Campus and CIBC Caribbean is a challenge that rewards staff for impactful and innovative ideas that lead to the generation of income for their unit/department and the Campus. The competition aims to inspire the entrepreneurial spirit of the Campus and provides a unique opportunity for staff at all levels and in all categories to become intentional about revenue generation. The challenge was first held in 2022. Members of staff, individually or as a group, are invited to develop a creative and professional outline business plan for an income-generating business or activity (product or service) that can generate revenue for the Campus and/or save costs. A total of BBD 60,000 as three monetary prizes are offered to the top three winners, who then have the opportunity to work to start the business activity within the guidelines of the University's policies and ordinances. The 2024 winners are presented below.

Quest Hill Ventures won the Innovate Competition from amongst seven teams that entered the competition. It was developed by Camille Russell and Geralyn Walkes from the Office of Marketing and Communications. The business will specialise in

immersive and interactive adventure tours and will offer visitors to Barbados another option to learn about the island while exploring its attractions and many areas of interest. The winning team copped BBD 30,000. It will leverage the expertise of the Department of History and Philosophy which has successfully organised hikes and bus tours around Barbados.

The second prize of BBD 20,000 was won by Dr Stefan Walcott, Dr Grace Ann Jackman and Dr Donna-Maria Maynard (Faculty of Culture, Creative and Performing Arts) with their venture, Caribbean Music Assessment Board which has the objective of establishing itself as the premier certification body for musicians in the Caribbean. The venture will partner with The UWI Cave Hill to offer examinations that integrate a distinctive repertoire of Caribbean music, promoting the regiion's rich musical heritage.

Third prize winners, Alexandra Tillet and Terescita Cox (Faculty of Social Sciences) copped BBD 10,000 for The UWI Afro-Caribbean Fashion and Art Academy which will provide higher and diverse levels of entertainment and education.

The team of Dr Kirk Douglas, Professor Troy Lorde and Gavin Bovell won a special innovation award valued BBD 9,000 for BimSkin, a pioneering medical product developed by local startup, Tidal Bioscience Inc. which specialises in the manufacturing and export of fish skin grafts for wound care.

The Research Ethics Committee

The Research Ethics Committee (REC) provides ethical review of research with human participants on the Cave Hill Campus. The REC jointly serves the Cave Hill Campus and the Barbados Ministry of Health and Wellness and coordinates review with the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Ethics Committee. Additionally, the REC reviews research projects from neighbouring nations if requested and coordinates with the RECs on other UWI campuses. Members are appointed by the Pro Vice-Chancellor for Research and include representatives from each Cave Hill Faculty, the Ministry of Health and Wellness, and the broader community, including both scientists and laypersons. The Committee maintains Federal Wide Assurance with the US Office of Human Research Protections and, therefore, has authority to review projects receiving US federal funding or otherwise subject to US regulatory requirements. In that context, the Committee is the Cave Hill Institutional Review Board (IRB).

Ethical review benefits researchers and the communities in which they work. Prior ethical review safeguards the human rights and wellbeing of participants and is a global best practice. Most publication outlets in the biomedical, social, and natural sciences require documentation of formal ethical review as a prerequisite for publication. Further, many funding sources require ethical review prior to committing to support a study; these include most major foundations, the US and European governmental funding agencies, and the Cave Hill Research Awards Committee.

The REC approved 141 research protocols from September 2023 to August 2024.

The Committee continued to offer a wide range of education and outreach activities, as well as individual ethics consultations, for students and members of staff. These included presentations to faculties and individual classes across campus, as well as regularly scheduled teaching in the undergraduate and postgraduate medical curriculum, including the postgraduate programmes in public health and nursing. The REC provides teaching support for the Research Supervisor Development Course and the Postgraduate Students' Workshop Series.

The Cave Hill Campus contributes to the development of research ethics in the region through publication, conference presentations, and service on research ethics bodies, including the UWI Cross-Campus Research Ethics Committee, the Caribbean Public Health Agency Research Ethics Committee, the Executive of the Caribbean Network of Research Ethics Committees, and the WHO Global Bioethics Summit.

Prospective researchers are informed that a requirement is free online training in ethics for all research team members through the Committee's partnership with the Collaborative Institutional Training Initiative (www.citiprogram.org). Either the Basic Biomedical or Social-Behavioural-Educational Course meets the requirements, and the researchers can choose the appropriate track for their disciplines. REC's CITI offerings now include optional courses on Good Clinical Practice (GCP), Animal Care and Use (ACU), Conflict of Interest (COI), and Information Privacy and Security (IPS).

The Cave Hill Research Ethics Committee is supporting the UWI Cross-Campus Research Ethics Policy Revision Committee, which is scheduled to complete work in 2025. Dr Mike Campbell and Ms Varsha Persaud are co-chairing the committee, and Dr Thea Scantlebury-Manning is leading the subcommittee expanding policy for animal care and use.







Dean of Postgraduate Affairs and Research in the Faculty of Social Sciences. The book was conceptualised, designed, and written to respond to the limited culture of program evaluation in the region and to demystify program evaluation.

Program evaluation is a positive pursuit and should be of pervasive concern in every discipline and sector. However, although program evaluation is now a standard practice in many developed countries, it is still quite underutilised in developing countries including countries in the English-speaking Commonwealth Caribbean region and is conducted mainly to satisfy funding requirements. A primary reason for its underutilisation hinges on the financial costs associated with program evaluation. Another reason is the lack of an evaluation culture in the region. Compounding these issues is a genuine fear of program evaluation due to misconceptions about the process, and the negative perception that many stakeholders have of evaluators who are often viewed as agents with a mission to lay blame. Evaluation serves many useful functions including program assessment, accountability, transparency, and most importantly learning, and improvement.




Strengthening Evaluation Culture is designed for a wide cross section of multidisciplinary users and is carefully crafted to avoid abstract and theoretical concepts. The forward was written by iconic evaluation trail blazer, the late Professor Michael Scriven who is regarded as a founding father of evaluation. Dr Lennise Baptiste, Secretary-General of the International Development Evaluation Association (IDEAS) lauded the Caribbean scholarship as an important landmark for the region. Dr Baptiste is a Caribbean independent evaluation consultant with over 35 years combined professional experience in the fields of education and program evaluation. The second book reviewer Mrs Valerie Gordon, President of Caribbean Evaluation International echoed similar sentiments. Mrs Gordon has over 30 years working experience in international development in the Caribbean, Africa and the Pacific.


The Routledge Companion to Applied Qualitative Research in the Caribbean, edited by Roy McCree, Natalie Dietrich Jones, Professor Corin Bailey, Professor of Sociology, Crime & Social Inequality and Director of The Institute of Criminal Justice and Security; and Dr Latoya Lazarus, Research Fellow in the Sir Arthur Lewis Institute of Social and Economic Studies, provides a comprehensive examination of applied qualitative research in the Caribbean. It highlights the methodological diversity of qualitative research by drawing on various approaches to the study of Caribbean society, addressing the lack of published qualitative research on the region.

UWI Cocoa Research Centre's Chocolates Enter Barbados Market

The UWI's world-renowned Cocoa Research Centre (CRC) introduced its signature chocolates to the Barbados market in a 'soft launch' at the University Bookshop, Cave Hill Campus on Monday, December 4, 2023. The launch which marked the CRC's first venture into the Barbadian market was led by St Augustine Campus Principal, Professor Rose-Marie Belle Antoine. Also in attendance were Vice-Chancellor, Professor Sir Hilary Beckles and the Cave Hill Campus Principal, Professor Clive Landis.

Professor Antoine led discussions which focused on the potential of the CRC's chocolates in Barbados with the President of the Barbados Chamber of Commerce and Industry (BCCI), Mr James "Jimmy" Clarke, and University Bookshop Manager, Mrs Beverly Smith-Hinkson. The soft launch of the CRC's chocolate-tasting session attracted enthusiastic students and was a highlight with both the students and members of the Barbados Chamber of Commerce and Industry (BCCI). The response to the chocolates was very positive, resulting in the BCCI expressing interest in a partnership, signalling promising prospects for the chocolates in Barbados.

The CRC also introduced its exclusive 50g chocolate bars which are available for purchase at the University Bookshop, along with other select venues. The highly sought-after 'Trinitario' cocoa, a hybrid between Criollo and Forastero, originated in Trinidad, home to the International Cocoa Genebank (ICG) which is housed at the CRC.

Public Health Integrated into Strategy to Fight Gun Trafficking and Violence

The George Alleyne Chronic Disease Research Centre (GACDRC) and several regional and international organisations formally came together from November 20-21, 2023, for a two-day meeting to establish a multi-sectoral Advisory Committee of Regional Experts to support their latest joint project *Pathway to Policy: Integrating Security and Public Health Responses to Firearms Trafficking and Violence in the Caribbean.*

The team included the Caribbean Community
Implementation Agency for Crime and Security
(CARICOM IMPACS); the Caribbean Public Health
Agency (CARPHA); the GACDRC; and the Small
Arms Survey, an associated programme of the
Geneva Graduate Institute. Members of the Advisory
Committee consisted of experts in a range of fields,
including economics, governance, forensic ballistics,
public health, law, clinical psychology, anthropology,
forensic pathology, education, youth, communications,
epidemiology, criminal justice, research, and security.

The Pathway to Policy: Integrating Security and Public Health Responses to Firearms Trafficking and Violence in the Caribbean initiative, which some believe is necessary to address the root factors and effects of gun violence, places emphasis on a transdisciplinary and a 'whole-of-society' approach to dealing with the problem.

Subsequent to the meeting of the Advisory
Committee, Dr Natasha Sobers and Professor Simon
Anderson of the GACDRC organised and led a
workshop which included contemporaries from the
Bahamas and Jamaica. The workshop focused on
the individual and the community, data collection,
regional systems that facilitate firearms trafficking and
the costs of violence in the region, with the aim of
informing further research in the area.

The basis for both discussions was the Weapons Compass: the Caribbean Firearms Study published in April 2023 which found that the homicide rate in the Caribbean is almost three times higher than the world average, and that violence in the region is closely associated with gangs and aggravated by the availability and use of illicit firearms. Quite concerning was research carried out in the Bahamas, Barbados, and Jamaica which revealed that the average medical expenditures for treating a single gunshot wound can exceed the annual health spending per capita by ratios ranging from 2:1 to 11.1, prompting the need for serious dialogue.

It laid the groundwork for expanding agribusiness opportunities within the innovative Dukes Agri-Industrial Park.

Standing at the forefront of agricultural innovation, bridging the gap between academia, government, and industry, CAGRI is committed to research, technology, and innovation, and devoted to driving the agricultural sector towards sustainability,

Cave Hill and interCaribbean Airways announce new partnership

The University of the West Indies, Cave Hill Campus partnered with regional airline, interCaribbean Airways to cater to the development of aviation students, and promote the growth of the regional air transport industry.

The two parties signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on Thursday, February 29, 2024 to collaborate in a number of areas including enhancing regional air connectivity, human resource development, scholarships, thought leadership as well as knowledge dissemination.

One of the key features of the agreement is academic collaboration, through which five annual scholarships in honour of Manville "Donnie" Gardiner, the late brother of the founder and chairman of the airline, Lyndon Gardiner are offered to deserving students enrolled in aviation programmes.

Principal, Professor Clive Landis saw the signing of the MOU as a committal to the idea of seamless travel within our region, bridging islands, cultures and aspirations.

Cave Hill and interCaribbean Airways also plan to create a dedicated think-tank for the Caribbean region to focus on innovation, policy advocacy, and strategic development.

2024 Science and Technology Festival

For three consecutive days, March 21-23, 2024, students at all levels across Barbados descended on the Lloyd Erskine Sandiford Centre (LESC), Two Mile Hill, St Michael for the 2024 Science and Technology Festival. The festival which was hosted by the Ministry of Industry, Innovation, Science and Technology (MIST) and the Faculty of Science and Technology (FST) of The University of the West Indies Cave Hill Campus, provided an opportunity for students to see

there is more to science than just academic learning, and highlighted the critical role science and technology plays in our existence.

Under the theme *Let's Innovate: Barbados*, budding scientists and members of the public experienced the thrill and excitement of new and innovative technologies, combined with a fun celebration of science. Attendees witnessed and participated in:

- interactive displays by young innovators
- robotic workshops that included aerial robotics, special coding and 3D printing

The Annual Science and Technology Festival aims to inform and inspire young people about STEM, giving them the confidence required to be innovative and entrepreneurial about technology. Panama's Minister of Foreign Affairs visits Cave Hill

Principal of The UWI Cave Hill Campus, Professor Clive Landis welcomed the Minister of Foreign Affairs of Panama, Her Excellency Janaina Tewaney Mencomo to the campus on Tuesday, March 26, 2024. Minister Mencomo met with members of senior management and students to discuss relations between Panama and the Caribbean, specifically, Barbados, in a presentation entitled A Foreign Policy for Panama 3.0: Staying Relevant in a Changing World. Trade emerged as a cornerstone of the bilateral discussions, with Carmen Gisela Vigara, the administrator of Panama's export and investment promotion authority, PROPANAMA, suggesting both nations explore avenues to enhance economic cooperation.

Her Excellency's visit came ahead of the planned opening of an Embassy of Panama in Barbados. In her remarks, she told the gathering that Barbados is an open door for Panama to the Caribbean for trade and education, and that such an initiative would create new frontiers for the people of both countries.

Minister Mencomo highlighted significant cultural commonalities between Barbados and Panama,

emphasising that Barbados' historical ties to Panama date back to the late 19th and early 20th centuries with the migration of tens of thousands of Barbadians workers to build the Panama Canal and railway.

Professor Landis avowed the University's eagerness to partner with the new embassy to develop its work plan in Barbados. He hailed the high importance placed on the role of the University in the process of enhancing mutual understanding and building even stronger linkages between the two nations' peoples and institutions in the future.

Principal Landis gave the assurance that as a fully accredited institution with quality degrees and graduates that are employable anywhere in the world, Cave Hill stands ready and well-equipped to partner with national universities and institutions in Panama.

He too saw this opportunity as a momentous occasion, given the historic ties that exist between Barbados and Panama.



RBC Race for the Kids raises \$100K

More than 1,600 participants came together on Sunday April 14, 2024 to run, walk, and skate for the cause. This global initiative which is now in its 8th year in Barbados continues to raise awareness and funds for student scholarships and bursaries.

Millington emphasised the significance of having Pounder moderate the interactive talk back session with Garnes and the audience, stressing that the two movie moguls brought a wealth of experience and insight to the table, and their involvement elevated the discussion to a higher level.

Cave Hill Hosts 166th Inter-American Court of Human Rights (IACtHR) Regular Session

In an unprecedented step taken by the Government of Barbados to host the Inter-American Court of Human Rights in-person public hearings, the Court held its 166th Regular Session at The UWI Cave Hill Campus, in the Sagicor Cave Hill School of Business and Management from April 22 to 26, 2024.

The session which was officially inaugurated in a ceremony, included an International Seminar on the Impact and Challenges of International Human Rights Law which was part of its regular session, and a public hearing on the Climate Emergency and Human Rights which was held in response to a request for an advisory opinion submitted by Colombia and Chile. A week-long series of discussions were initiated on human resources and the climate crisis, underscoring the need for dialogue and international cooperation.

In parallel to the historic 166th Regular Session of the IACtHR, the Cave Hill Campus signed an agreement with the IACtHR on April 23, 2024 that is expected to result in improved capacity-building. Deliverables

include, yearly professional practicum programmes for staff and graduates of the Campus, student internships with the Court, joint research opportunities and other areas of mutual benefit for both institutions.

The framework cooperation agreement which has an initial three-year timeline was signed by Pro Vice-Chancellor and Principal of the Cave Hill Campus, Professor Clive Landis and President of the Court, Judge Nancy Hernández López. It was witnessed by Dean of the Faculty of Law, Dr Antonius Hippolyte along with representatives from both institutions.

The hearings provided a platform for governments, researchers, civil society, and youth to express their concerns about the human rights issues related to climate change.

Greater Global Cooperation Needed says Baroness Patricia Scotland, Commonwealth Secretary General

Outgoing Commonwealth Secretary General, The Rt Honourable Baroness Patricia Scotland has highlighted the need for an unprecedented level of international, political and economic cooperation to address the myriad challenges facing the world today.

Baroness Scotland was delivering the inaugural Commonwealth lecture entitled Legacy: Seventy-Five Years of the Modern Commonwealth, at the Sagicor Cave Hill School of Business and Management on Friday, May 03, 2024. Her speech traced the connections between the 56 nations for more than seven decades.

She told the audience, which comprised government ministers, campus representatives, students and others, that in addition to the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, the world is grappling with crippling debt, inflation and high interest rates; spiralling food and energy prices; instability and conflict; and the increasingly harsh impact of climate change.

The international diplomat also noted that in an increasingly polarised environment, people are anxious about the capacity of governments and international

institutions to provide the leadership and action required.

Her speech highlighted that both small and large states have been affected by climate shocks which have devastating economic and human impacts that could lead to increased debt, as countries turn to multilateral financial institutions to finance recovery efforts.

Outlining some of the work of the Commonwealth Secretariat, she noted that the Commonwealth Meridian system supports governments in handling their debts so that they can more efficiently manage their obligations.

After her address, in a conversation dubbed a 'veranda chat' with Dr Jan Yves Remy, Director of the Shridath Ramphal Centre for International Trade Law, Policy and Services, the Secretary-General further explored several of the issues raised in her speech, namely, the growing importance of digital technology, including artificial intelligence in the Commonwealth Secretariat's work.

Principal of The UWI Cave Hill Campus, Professor Clive Landis, deemed the lecture significant and timely, noting that the Commonwealth was celebrating its 75th anniversary on the heels of The UWI's own diamond jubilee.

The Liberia "Sankofa" Pilgrimage to Barbados

Descendants of Barbadian-Liberians assembled at The UWI Cave Hill Campus on Thursday, May 9, 2024 for a celebration of their heritage, as part of the Sankofa Pilgrimage which recognised the 159th anniversary of the migration of 346 Barbadians to the West African country. The historic event which was celebrated in Barbados from May 6-13 under the theme *The Pilgrimage to Barbados* was coordinated by a team from Liberia, headed by Ambassador Lorenzo Llewellwyn Witherspoon and the Division of Culture in the Prime Minister's Office.

Over 250 Liberians travelled to Barbados as part of the tour, which was held during Barbados' Season of Emancipation, which commemorates the abolition of slavery.

Participants at The UWI Sankofa exposition were treated to cultural exchanges, as well as educational sessions on the connections between Bridgetown and Monrovia (Liberia's capital).

The Sankofa Pilgrimage presented an opportunity to improve diplomatic relations between the

two countries, broaden Barbadians' knowledge of Liberia and explore opportunities for cultural cooperation. The Liberian descendants also used this opportunity to trace their ancestries and build family ties.

Guardians of Caribbean Sovereignty

The Guyana-Venezuela territorial dispute has been an ongoing source of contention between the two nations.

Following the decision of Venezuela to hold a referendum on December 3, 2023 to ascertain its citizens' opinion on whether it should create a new "state" in Essequibo, Guyana sought provisional measures before the International Court of Justice (ICJ). On November 28, 2023, the ICJ held unanimously that:

- Pending a final decision in the case, Venezuela should refrain from taking any action which would modify the situation that currently prevails in the territory in dispute, whereby Guyana administers and exercises control over that area;
- 2. Both Parties should refrain from any action which might aggravate or extend the dispute before the ICJ or make it more difficult to resolve.

The UWI, with its expertise from the Faculty of Law and Faculty of Social Sciences at the Cave Hill Campus, lent its voice on the controversy, sharing views on how the issue might be resolved. Themed, *Guarding Sovereignty*, The University of the West Indies Vice-Chancellor's Forum was held virtually on Tuesday, December 12, 2023.

The presentation, which was a collaborative undertaking of the Office of the Vice-Chancellor and the Faculties of Law and Social Sciences at the Cave Hill Campus, was moderated by Professor Cynthia Barrow-Giles, Professor of Constitutional Governance and Politics at Cave

Hill and comprised an expert panel that included The Honourable Mohabir Anil Nandlall MP, SC, Attorney-General, Minister of Legal Affairs and Member of the Parliament of Guyana; Ambassador Riyad Insanally, Senior Fellow, Caribbean Initiative of the Atlantic Council's Adrienne Arsht Center for Latin America; Professor Anthony Bryan, Founder and Co-Director, Caribbean Policy Consortium; Professor Ivelaw Lloyd Griffith, Senior Associate, Center for Strategic and International Studies; Dr Duane Edwards, Senior Lecturer, Department of Sociology, University of Guyana; and Mrs Nicole Foster, Law Lecturer, Faculty of Law, The UWI Cave Hill Campus.





FINANCIAL REPORT ON CAMPUS ACTIVITIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED JULY 31, 2024

INCOME

Government Contributions

During the year under review the Campus recorded BBD 98.7 million in contributions from governments, before any adjustments for the expected credit loss (ECL), compared to BBD 94.1 in 2022/2023. This year's contribution included BBD 3.765 million relating to arrears of salaries, which means the level of support from the governments remained at roughly the same as the previous year. The Campus requested support in the amount of BBD 103.313 million from the governments to cover operating expenses.

The Campus is deeply grateful to the Ministries of Education, Technological & Vocational Training, and Finance & Economic Planning for consistently honouring the monthly contributions, which play a crucial role in supporting payroll obligations.

The Office of Finance also continued to follow up the outstanding arrears with other Governments. The balance due from the governments of the region on July 31, 2024 was approximately BBD 32.1 million (before adjustments) compared with BBD 35.1 million at the end of July 31, 2023.

Tuition Fees and Other Student Fees

The Campus saw a slight increase in tuition fees to BBD 25.4 million this year (up from BBD 24.5 million in 2023) while maintaining its commitment to supporting students through partial scholarships.

Some governments have requested the Campus to bill them directly for their students. However, the Campus does not penalise students for outstanding balances resulting from non-payment by their respective governments. Table 12 reflects the balances as at July 31, 2024, and July 31, 2023, respectively, of the amounts owed by governments.

Special and Other Project Income

The Campus recorded a decline in the amount earned from special projects as a few large projects concluded in the last financial year. The amount earned during the year was BBD 2.247 million compared with BBD 9.652 million in 2023. A list of new externally funded projects is provided later in this report. Other Income comprises self-financing activities, including the Taught Masters Programmes and the MBBS Programme.

Student Amenities Fees

Funding from the amenities fee continued to be used to enhance and enrich the out-of-classroom experience for students. Among the services provided were the Student Heath Scheme covering all registered students, free student bus shuttle and various activities relating to sports, counseling and student professional development. Table 13 outlines the revenue collected and allocated to the various functions which the amenities fees service.

Other Income

The Campus continued its efforts to generate additional income by investing its cash reserves. It also pursued various revenue-generating initiatives, including the previously mentioned self-financing Master's programmes.

Commercial Activities

Overall, the Halls of Residence continued to record a surplus, albeit a marginal one this year of BBD 0.036 million (0.034 million in 2023), as there were continued significant refurbishments undertaken at the three locations. The level of losses increased for the Bookshop during the year to BBD 0.782 million (0.036 million in 2023), as some inventory had to be provided for in addition to the rising cost of books.

EXPENDITURE

The Campus remained dedicated to advancing sustainability in alignment with national efforts. This commitment was evident in the continued decline in printer expenses, as more Faculties and administrative departments transitioned to digital solutions. There was little activity on capital projects during the period, with efforts focused on continuing critical maintenance work.

ASSETS AND LIABILITIES

Cash

The Campus recorded a continuing decline in its cash resources. The balance at the end of July 31, 2024, was approximately BBD 1.6 million less than that at the July 31, 2023 – which was BBD 22.1 million, compared with BBD 23.7 million in the previous year. These remaining balances were restricted to cover pension funds, payroll expenses and grant funds.

Payments during the year were funded by receipts from contributing governments, tuition fees and other income. The Campus, however, continued to settle all its statutory obligations on time.

Accounts Receivable

This figure includes tuition fees owed by third parties in the amount of BBD 65.5 million (July 31, 2023 - 64.3 million) as well as amounts due from students and staff members. Most of this balance is attributable to amounts owed by some governments which the Campus bills for tuition fees for their nationals. Other receivables from grants declined due to the completion of projects during the year. For the year under review, the Campus continued to receive VAT refunds and by year end, the VAT receivable had reduced by approximately BBD 391,000. The Campus continues to follow up on the older VAT receivables. See Table 14.

Property, Plant and Equipment

The Campus continued to maintain an efficient plant, but was not able to provide all the necessary repairs to the facilities with the continued increase in receivables from governments, both from their commitments to the operations of the Campus and for tuition fees on behalf of their nationals. The Campus was grateful to receive financial support from a private sector entity and the Ministry of Sport to facilitate the replacement of the track at the Usain Bolt Complex. This was immediately mobilised for the schools' athletic competitions in March 2024.

Current Liabilities

This balance includes the accrual for payments to creditors, current portion of long-term debt and amounts due to staff who have either resigned or retired and have not indicated where they require their funds to be forwarded. The FSSU and Superannuation obligations are included as part of the restricted cash balance. These obligations are within the next financial period and will be settled as resources become available. See Table 15.

Mr Ian Hickling

Lenses manufactured in Barbados for over 26 years have been used in cataract surgeries across the world transforming vision and countless lives.

Mr Ian Hickling was born in New Zealand, a country known in the biochemistry world for the discovery of ribosomal frameshifting and also pioneering work in the discovery of DNA sequencing. He holds a BSc degree in Cell

Biology and Biochemistry as well as an MSc degree in Biochemistry from The University of Auckland. He is also the holder of a Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree from Warwick University Business School.

Ian Hickling is the President of Lenstec (Barbados) Inc., a commercial medical device factory which he opened in 1996, right here in "Destination Barbados"! Lenstec develops and manufactures intraocular lenses and currently employs more than 260 persons. The manufacturing technologies and processes are designed and built in-house by Lenstec's engineering staff, and many of its employees are UWI graduates. Lenstec's proprietary lens manufacturing technologies, including microprecision lathes, mills, polishing equipment, and moulds, have enabled the company to produce premium lenses with reduced variability to help improve surgical predictability. Its lenses are produced for several intraocular lens companies under private label. Currently, more intraocular lenses are made with Lenstec technology worldwide than any other system.

Mr Hickling was invited by Export Barbados to serve as a Member of its Life Sciences Oversight Committee to oversee the development of a Life Sciences industry in Barbados under The Bio-Island initiative. He has delivered keynote addresses to the Barbados Association of Professional Engineers Annual Conference, and The UWI Cave Hill Campus Science Festival. In a civic capacity, he has served on the Board of Management and the Parent-Teacher Association at St. Gabriel's School in Barbados.

Prior to establishing Lenstec in Barbados, Mr Hickling was the Industrial Research Biochemist at New Zealand Pharmaceuticals Ltd, Research and Development Manager/Production Manager at Spectrum Laboratories Division of Douglas Pharmaceuticals Ltd, Quality Assurance Manager at Nufarm Ltd and Manager of Technology Transfer, The Fred Hollows Foundation.

For exemplifying the principle that a worldclass export manufacturing company can be built in Barbados, and for maintaining and expanding the business successfully for over 26 years, The University of the West Indies, conferred on **Mr Ian Hickling**, the Degree of Doctor of Science, *honoris causa*.

Mrs Alison Hinds-Walcott, Cultural Ambassador

There is no man, or woman, who has used a stage as a canvas, and a microphone as a paintbrush to so passionately personify the vibrancy and diversity of the Caribbean people as has Alison Hinds. "In the Meantime", listen to "Faluma", as we "Turn It Up", "With Caution", the true "Togetherness", and "Aye Aye Aye", because we are "Born Wid It"!

The eruptive volcanic voice of a 17-year-old performing on stage with her band Square One, performing for an audience across the diaspora.

This Cultural Ambassador was born in the United Kingdom and lived there for the first decade of her life. She was bitten with an immediate and infectious love for Caribbean genres when she migrated to Barbados at the age of 11. At age 17, she joined the band Square One and set off with them on an explosive trajectory of multiple award-winning pieces such as "Faluma" and "Ragamuffin". "Faluma", which topped the charts in many Caribbean and Central American countries, is still considered one of the greatest ever Soca songs.

In 2005, Alison Hinds formed her own band, released her first solo album entitled *Soca Queen*, and by cultural baptism, became known as the Caribbean's Soca Queen! The awards continued, and in 2006 her "Roll It Gal" peaked at #52 on the Billboard R&B charts! The equally rivaling classic "Togetherness" is still a staple on the lyrical menu of many Caribbean festivals around the world!

Alison Hinds has received numerous awards, and has been featured at many high-profile events. While they are too many to state here, some of them include:

- 2014 Appointed International Federation of Business and Professional Women (BPW International) Goodwill Ambassador.
- 2016 Sang the United States national anthem before the start of the National Basketball Association (NBA) match-up between Brooklyn Nets and Cleveland Cavaliers at the Barclays Center.

- 2018 Received the designation Barbados Cultural Ambassador from Prime Minister Freundel Stuart.
 She joined Rihanna as the only other female to be designated with a Cultural Ambassador post for Barbados.
- 2018 On June 28, Alison Hinds headlined Rotterdam Carnival 2018. She performed in front of a partisan crowd of 45,000 people.
- 2018 On August 9, she was again honoured in New York City. She received the Brooklyn proclamation by the Mayor of Brooklyn for her outstanding career and service to the Caribbean community.
- 2019 Performed at the Vodafone Ghana Video Music Awards, becoming the first soca artist to ever perform at the Ghana Music Awards.

- 2019 Was a prominent cast member in the Afro-Caribbean movie *Joseph*. The movie was shot in Jamaica and Ghana.
- 2021 In August 2021, she became the first soca artist to be interviewed on New York's most popular radio show - the Breakfast Club. She highlighted her journey as an artist and spoke about her family life during the interview.
- 2021 In October 2021, Alison Hinds was honoured by the city of Miramar for her outstanding contribution to the arts and entertainment field at the Annual Black British Awards Ceremony.

This songbird prodigy, also lends her voice to advocacy, in the areas of AIDS awareness, women's rights, diabetes and cancer awareness, and the

vitally important support for children living with disabilities.

This is a celebration of the remarkable achievements and contributions of a true Barbadian icon. This "Queen of Soca" has electrified audiences around the world with her powerful voice, infectious energy, and vibrant personality. She has been a trailblazer in the music industry, blending Caribbean rhythms with international appeal, and spreading the joy of soca music far and wide. In addition to her music, Alison Hinds has been an inspiration to countless aspiring artists, particularly women, who look up to her as a role model of strength and perseverance in a male-dominated industry.

Today the region has a far more diverse cultural identity due to the single voice of Alison Hinds. For her accomplishments, The University of the West Indies, conferred on **Mrs Alison Hinds-Walcott**, the Degree of Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa*.

Dr Heather Harewood

Recipient of the Principal's Award for Excellence – Outstanding Teaching

Dr Heather Harewood, BSc, MBBS (UWI), MPH (Birmingham), DrPH, high commendation (UWI) is a Lecturer in Public Health and Epidemiology in the Department of Preclinical and Health Sciences, Faculty of Medical Sciences (FMS). She joined the Faculty in 2015, assumed leadership of the Master of Public Health (MPH) programme in 2016 and subsequently

became Head of the Public Health group in 2019. During her tenure, the Public Health programme has grown from strength to strength.

Over the past five years, Dr Harewood has taught four undergraduate and nine postgraduate courses and coordinates two undergraduate and five postgraduate courses. Her annual contact hours exceed the departmental average and includes postgraduate student supervision. She consistently receives favourable student evaluation scores, which exceed the FMS average. She routinely attends professional

development activities including Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning (CETL) webinars.

Over the past five years, Dr Harewood supervised 14 MPH projects, was local advisor for three external MPH projects and co-supervised one DM project. She currently supervises two MPhil and one PhD student, is on the advisory panel of three graduate research students and is an examiner for the DrPH programme, The UWI, Mona.

Administratively, Dr Harewood holds responsibility for four postgraduate programmes: the MPH, the EMBA - Health Care Management, and the UWI-PAHO Postgraduate programmes in Policy and Health Systems. She chairs three (3) Public Health Committees and also plays a pivotal role in quality assurance and accreditation activities, including leading the self-study for the 2021 Quality Assurance Review for the Public Health postgraduate programmes.

Dr Harewood's successful collaborations with varied colleagues has strengthened existing undergraduate and postgraduate programmes and established new postgraduate programmes, aligning with The UWI strategy of agility and increased access.

At the undergraduate level she launched a Public Health elective for Year 4 Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) students in 2019, in conjunction with the Ministry of Health and Wellness and the George Alleyne Chronic Disease Research Centre.

At the postgraduate level, Dr Harewood's commitment to cross-faculty and cross-campus collaboration is evident in her work with the HEU Centre for Health Economics, The UWI, St. Augustine, since 2019, to strengthen the delivery of the MPH Health Economics course. She worked with the Cave Hill School of Business and Management to co-develop the EMBA - Health Care Management Postgraduate Degree, which started in January 2021.

Notably, Dr Harewood's extra-mural collaboration efforts secured a USD 60,000 grant from the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) to develop and deliver the UWI-PAHO postgraduate Diploma and Certificate in Health Policy and Health Systems, which commenced in August 2022. She coordinated a press

conference and a regional webinar, "Health Policy Development in the Caribbean: Trends, Challenges and Opportunities", respectively launching and publicising the programmes.

Dr Harewood, a reflective practitioner, delights in co-creating knowledge with her students, being a good listener and advisor, and supporting them to present their work at local, regional and international fora. Her colleagues affirm how much students enjoy and learn from her courses. Her students cite her supportive "guide by the side" approach to teaching and her focus on their all-around academic and personal development.

Dr Mahalia Jackman

Recipient of the Principal's Award for Excellence – Outstanding Research Accomplishment (Academic)

Dr Mahalia Jackman joined the Department of Economics in the Faculty of Social Sciences at The UWI, Cave Hill Campus as a Temporary Lecturer in Economics. She was promoted to Senior Lecturer in 2020 and appointed Head of the Department of Economics in 2021.

Dr Jackman's research output has been remarkable, spanning a broad spectrum of issues pertinent to Barbados and the global community. During the last five years, she has published 15 pieces of work - 12 refereed journal articles and three (3) monographs - while juggling a full teaching load and serving as Head of the Department of Economics and on various university committees. She was an active participant in academic dialogues, presenting 14 papers at esteemed conferences such as the Society for the Scientific Study of Sexuality Annual Meeting and the World Research Summit for Hospitality and Tourism. An esteemed highlight was her paper on LGBT-inclusive tourism marketing, which clinched 3rd place at the 6th World Research Summit for Tourism and Hospitality. Her overall publication record includes 52 refereed journal articles, three (3) monographs and one (1) technical report.

Dr Jackman's research is not confined to a singular domain. Rather, it is guided by what questions are

interesting. Despite starting her research journey in macroeconomics, Dr Jackman's work has expanded beyond the traditional boundaries of that field. From the economics of tourism and greening to gender inequality, from the dynamics of LGBTQ+ rights to the fiscal implications of early childhood development, her work cuts across multiple disciplines, reflecting a holistic approach to understanding the complexities of Caribbean societies.

Dr Jackman's multifaceted approach ensures that her work remains relevant to a diverse audience. Of particular note, her work on the LGBTQ+ community provides an invaluable insight into a marginalised community, while her research on early childhood development in Saint Lucia and Barbados underscores the importance of investment in the early years. These works do more than just add to the body of knowledge; they influence policies and create pathways for more inclusive, equitable development in the region. Much of her research on sexual prejudice in the Caribbean has been referenced in policy documents related to the treatment of sexual minorities in the Caribbean; for example, organisations such as the International Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans and Intersex

Association, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and Columbia Law School's Sexuality and Gender Law Clinic have cited her research. Excerpts from her work were also featured in a petition by members of the LGBT community in Barbados to the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights, Organisation of American States for the decriminalisation of "buggery" and "acts of serious indecency" in Barbados. She has also served as an expert witness and provided affidavits on the living conditions of LGBTQ+ people in the Caribbean.

Her passion for research is evident in her mentoring of the next generation of economic researchers. In the last five years, she has supervised 10 students in the MSc Financial and Business Economics programme, one (1) MPhil student to completion and she sits on the advisory committees for several other MPhil/PhD students. Dr Jackman's mentorship extends beyond the university setting. She recently served as the Research Advisor to the Research and Economic Analysis Department at the Central Bank of Barbados from April to August 2023.

Dr Mahalia Jackman is easily classified as a well-rounded researcher whose tentacles envelop the academic, policy and practical domains. She epitomises the pinnacle of research brilliance and contribution with which The UWI is known. It is for these reasons that Dr Mahalia Jackman is the winner of the Principal's Award for Excellence in Research for 2023-24.

This quote fittingly describes Mrs Tanya Martelly's journey as Research Manager at the George Alleyne Chronic Disease Research Centre (GA-CDRC), a post unique to both the Centre and the Cave Hill Campus. Described by many as passionate, professional, reliable, dedicated, and a leader in every way, Mrs Martelly accepted the challenge of being a pioneer by traversing uncharted waters to develop a research management infrastructure for the Unit. Mrs Martelly has demonstrated exceptional tenacity, initiative, and an unwavering commitment to purpose, and has received consistently high accolades from local and international colleagues through customer feedback surveys and written emails.

Mrs Martelly's excellence in creative and innovative leadership has materially enhanced the operational efficiency and effectiveness of the Unit, Campus and beyond through the development of:

She goes repeatedly beyond the call of duty to assist her colleagues, by making financial projections for project expenditure and preventative planning to mitigate any upcoming financial challenges during the project's duration as well as negotiating for pre-financing arrangements on reimbursable grants to help manage the University's cash flow. She has also assisted both undergraduate and graduate students through teaching, management of their research awards, and provision of advice on the research process.

Mrs Martelly's excellence is also seen in her initiative to stay on the cutting edge of her rapidly changing and diverse field of research management. She has credentials and certification in several areas in research management, risk management, and master's degrees in both Public Health and Business Administration, the latter which she achieved the highest level of excellence, and was given the honour of being the valedictorian for the graduating class of 2020 at her alma mater.

Recipient of the Principal's Award for Excellence -Outstanding Contribution in two or more categories (Research and Public Service)

Dr Nadini Persaud is a Lecturer in Evaluation at the Sagicor Cave Hill School of Business and Management and Deputy Dean, Research and Innovation, and Entrepreneurship, Faculty of Social Sciences at The UWI Cave Hill Campus. She holds a PhD in Evaluation from Western Michigan University, an MSc in Project Management and Evaluation (Distinction) from UWI, a BSc in Accounting (First Class Honours), UWI, and two professional designations: - Certified Public Accountant (CGA Gold Award) and Chartered Professional Accountant (CPA).

Dr Persaud, a Fulbright Scholar, joined The UWI in 2007. During her 15+ years at The UWI, she has taught primarily at the graduate level, contributed to graduate program development, served as Program Coordinator for the MSc Project Management and Evaluation program (2009-2016), and supervised dozens of evaluation practicums. In terms of University service, she has served on numerous departmental, faculty, university, and cross-campus committees including nonprofessorial representative on Academic Board, member of the campus committee on examinations, member of the campus library committee, Vice-President, Secretary/ Treasurer, and Faculty of Social Sciences representative on the West Indies Group of University Teachers (WIGUT), and Chair of the WIGUT Blue Book and Career Path Committees.

Dr Persaud is actively involved in public and professional service in her substantive disciplines at both the regional and international levels. She is an invited member of the Faster Forward Fund Advisory Committee in the USA, established by the late Professor Michael Sciven to accelerate the theory, practice, and profession of evaluation (2012 - present). She has also been invited to serve on several committees of the American Evaluation Association including six years on the Financial Advisory Board (Chair 2014, 2019), Program Chair, of the Costs,

Dr Persaud is the sole author of a referee evaluation book (in press), along with three co-authored referee books on evaluation. Her recent evaluation text published by Guilford Publications in the USA was inspired by and dedicated to the late Professor Michael Scriven, a pioneer and founding father of evaluation. She has also published over 30 peer-reviewed journal articles, book chapters, encyclopedia and

magazine articles. Her publications also include several technical reports and articles in Caribbean Eval Chat. Her body of work is focused on promoting and encouraging the use of evaluation in the region, and on incorporating cost analysis into professional evaluations. She has presented over 25 referee conference papers on evaluation and has been a panelist on several Caribbean/Latin America panels during global evaluation week over the last few years.

Mr Devon Slater

Recipient of the Principal's Award for Excellence - Administrative, Technical and Service Staff (ATS) category

How many of you can imagine your supervisor saying to you "We are importing some rats for experimental purposes and we would like you to look after them?" For Devon Slater, it was "I am not too sure about this doc, but I am willing to help." Such is the nature of the man who is being celebrated.

Born in Jamaica, Devon Delroy Slater migrated to Barbados in 1986 and became employed at The UWI in 2004 as a General Worker assigned to the Department of Biological and Chemical Sciences. Science would become an integral part of Devon's life and those who know him, know that he was always destined to rise to the top through a combination of hard work, curiosity, pride, and the willingness to serve.

The term General Worker does not do justice to the contributions of Mr Slater. While his main responsibilities surrounded gardening tasks, he held responsibility for the cultivation and care of plants used in teaching. He has always been punctual, reliable and

would do anything for his beloved students. He taught practical skills to students so that they could achieve success in their experiments and these students have had no qualms about interrupting his lunch or escape from campus, because they knew that he would drop everything and provide assistance. Annually, Devon climbs the heights of Hillaby to retrieve a plant that only grows in that ecosystem because no task is too much to ensure that the students have what they need. Relatedly, he is a master grower of pineapples and passes on plant cultivation/growth concepts to the youth through workshops and visits to his farm by St. Silas Primary and St. Leonards Boys Secondary Schools, which were highlighted in the media. Additionally, he engages with students from The UWI and McGill University who participate in the Barbados Interdisciplinary Tropical Studies summer programme aimed at exposing students to a wide range of agrifood-energy industries.

Devon is an integral part of the Department's 'Rent-a-Plant' initiative which seeks to generate income for the Department. He has oversight for the plants which sees him having to come in on weekends, public holidays and vacation. Yet he has never once uttered the words 'I don't want to anymore'. Au contraire, he is always requesting that the collection of plants be increased!

Devon was also instrumental in the establishment of a bioreactor in the Department which supported the 'Grass-to-Gas' project, generating biogas from the grass clippings on campus thereby reducing the cost of LPG by using the biogas to power the Bunsen Burners in the biology laboratories.

One could not conclude without mentioning the floral arranging talents of Mr Slater as evidenced by the vases of fresh flowers that adorn the offices of many staff members – bringing delight and excitement to female faces on a daily basis. His creations have also beautified the launch of the Centre for Commercial Analytical Services earlier this year and the "The Potential of the Coconut Industry for Sustainable Development' workshop held recently at The UWI in conjunction with the EU, Cariforum, ACP, ITC and CARDI.

Finally, the rats. Devon ensured that they received adequate food and water and that their cages were cleaned allowing a medical graduate student to successfully complete her experimental work. There were reservations, but once Devon was assured that the rats were not Bridgetown rats and they had been bred specifically for experimental purposes and were cleaner than most humans, he underwent the training and took on the task with gusto. One could detect his sadness when the rats had to be euthanised.

Devon will 'graduate' from the campus next year and his accomplishments will continue to grow. He is recognised as a colleague who has made the most of what was given to him and always looked to better himself and those around him – staff and especially the students. Well done Devon!

Dr Henri Vallès

Recipient of the Principal's Award for Excellence - Outstanding Research Accomplishment (Academic)

There is absolutely no doubt that Dr Henri Vallès is a prodigious researcher deserving of the Principal's Award for Excellence. Dr Vallès' work continues to put UWI on the map for excellent marine research across a very broad range of topics highly applicable to Barbados and the Wider Caribbean.

His areas of expertise include: Management and Innovation in Small-scale Fisheries; Ecological Relationships in Coral Reef Communities; Climate Change Impacts on Marine Ecosystems; Marine and Coastal Biodiversity; Sampling Design and Statistical Analysis of complex ecological datasets; to name but a few! He also has a strong interest in terrestrial biodiversity and in the promotion and recognition of Caribbean scientists. Incredibly, he has published widely on all of these topics (and more) with some 34 papers in highly regarded international peer-reviewed journals and books, with half of them in just the last five (5) years and almost all first-authored by himself or his students. He has also published a similar number of detailed technical reports. All this requires funding especially for marine fieldwork, and Dr Vallès has been awarded many personal grants as well as successfully

co-attracting substantial project funding for the University (close to a quarter million US dollars).

His recent notable publications (just over the last two years), all in different high-impact scientific journals, have included: 1. Elucidating the distribution patterns of juvenile reef fish in Guadeloupe; 2. Documenting the marine crab biodiversity in Barbados; 3. Investigating the impact of oceanic origin on the variable sargassum arrivals; 4. Challenges of operating and managing moored fish aggregating devices in the Caribbean; 5. Revealing the free swimming biodiversity associated with pelagic sargassum and the management dilemma between fishing opportunity and sargassum harvest and disposal; and 6. Illustrating the limited progress in improving gender and geographic representation in coral reef science.

Dr Vallès is not just an academic who buries himself in his work, head down, focused and productive – he is engaged in many other important aspects of a truly great researcher. He has supervised and continues to supervise an impressive line-up of some 30 undergraduate and post-graduate MSc, MPhil and PhD research students from The UWI and beyond. As a multi-lingual and highly regarded scientist, he provides

expert guidance and leadership to several national and regional institutions and scientific working groups including: the Gulf and Caribbean Fisheries Institute (as a member, vice chair and chair of the Board of Directors); the Western Central Atlantic Fishery Commission (as a lead author); the Bellairs Research Institute of McGill University (as a member of the Board of Directors); the French-based Institute for Research and Development (IRD) (as an expert scientist); the Caribaea Initiative (as member of the Scientific Council); and as an appointed member of the Biodiversity Working Group of the Barbados Government. He has acted as an ad hoc reviewer for countless peer-reviewed journals, as an examiner of many post-graduate theses, and has communicated his research findings through more than 50 conference presentations, as well as featured in, or assisted with the production of, a number of short educational/ documentary films and media articles.

Dr Henri Vallès is indeed an all-round excellent academic researcher of whom The University of the West Indies is justly proud.

PROMOTION TO THE RANK OF PROFESSOR

Professor of Inclusive Education and Disability Studies

Professor Stacey Blackman specialises in Inclusive and Special Education. An educator at the School of Education in the Faculty of Humanities and Education, Cave Hill Campus, she has served as Discipline Coordinator of the BEd Special Education and MEd Inclusive Practices as well as the Coordinator for both the Associate degree and BEd in Education.

From 2010 to 2011, Professor Blackman served as the Lead Consultant on a UNICEF-UWI Consulting project evaluating the quality of the learning environments and teaching methodologies for special education in Barbados. She has also served as the Archivist – Caribbean and African Studies SiG for the American Education Research Association; a series editor for publications on inclusive education by Routledge, Information Age Publishing, and volume editor for Springer Publishing; and has sat on several journal

review committees including those for the *Cambridge*Journal of Education and Caribbean Curriculum.

Professor Blackman holds a PhD (University of Cambridge); MEd and BA (Hons) (The UWI) and certification in University Teaching from The UWI and Competency in Education Testing from the British Psychological Society. Her publication record includes 13 peer-reviewed journal articles; 24 conference papers; four (4) book chapters and six (6) books. In 2020, her book Achieving Inclusive Education in the Caribbean and Beyond was recognised by Springer Publication as among the top consulted publications for the UN's Sustainable Development Goals in Education. Assessors commend her research output and publication outlets as 'high-quality', one stating, "Her edited volumes show her mastery of her research area."

As an educator, Professor Blackman has supervised eight (8) graduate students and six (6) MPhil/PhD candidates within the Inclusive Practice Specialisation. This is exclusive of several other MEd students supervised since 2005. Her contributions to curriculum development include the design and teaching of several graduate and undergraduate courses. She is currently creating a new BEd Inclusive Practices at the undergraduate level to provide hybrid training for both general and special education teachers in the region. The programme will specifically feature technology integration in assessment, curriculum and pedagogy.



Total On-Campus Student Registration by Level 2015/2016 - 2024/2025




Distribution of Total On-Campus Student Registration 2024/2025 by Nationality and Faculty/Institute




Distribution of Total On-Campus Student Registration 2024/2025 by Faculty/Institute




Distribution of Undergraduate Students 2024/2025 by Faculty




Distribution of Postgraduate Student 2024/2025 by Faculty/Institute




All Students from Non-UWI Countries Registered in 2024/2025




Distribution of Total On-Campus Student Registration 2024/2025 by Faculty/Institute and Gender




Distribution of Total On-Campus Student Registration 2024/2025 by Faculty/Institute and Status




Distribution of Total On-Campus Student Registration 2024/2025 by Gender




Distribution of Total On-Campus Student Registration 2024/2025 by Status




Distribution of Undergraduate Students 2024/2025 by Nationality




Distribution of Postgraduate Students 2024/2025 by Nationality







60@60





Three distinguished alumni of The UWI Cave Hill Campus have been named 2024 Laureates of the Anthony N Sabga Caribbean Awards for Excellence. Their remarkable contributions in public service, the arts, and science reaffirm the university's role in shaping regional and global leaders.

Kerryann Ifill: Advocate for Disability Rights

The Most Honourable Kerryann Ifill, FB, has dedicated her life to advocating for persons with disabilities. Losing her sight at age four did not deter her; she became the first visually impaired graduate of The UWI Cave Hill with honours, later earning an MBA and a postgraduate diploma in Special Education.

Ms Ifill has championed assistive technology and inclusive education policies, ensuring equal opportunities for students with disabilities. She has served as President of the Barbados Council for the Disabled and the Caribbean Council for the Blind, as well as Vice-Chair of the Commonwealth Disabled People's Forum. Her contributions have reshaped disability advocacy across the region.

Currently, she serves on the Barbados Constitutional Reform Commission and the National Committee for the Monitoring of the Rights of the Child. In recognition of her work, she received the Order of Freedom of Barbados on November 30, 2023 on the occasion of Barbados' 57th Anniversary of Independence. The UWI Cave Hill Campus proudly honours her as the 2024 Public & Civic Contributions Laureate.

Dr Morris Scantlebury: Innovator in Pediatric Neurology

Dr Morris Scantlebury has revolutionised the study and treatment of childhood epilepsy. His research has led to critical advancements in early intervention, including a patented model for Infantile Epileptic Spasms, offering hope to affected families.

Despite his base at the University of Calgary,
Dr Scantlebury remains committed to the Caribbean.
For over a decade he has provided free paediatric
epilepsy clinics in Barbados. His company has
introduced cloud-based paediatric brain monitoring
in Trinidad and Tobago and Dominica, improving
regional access to specialised care.

For his pioneering work in neurology, The UWI Cave Hill Campus proudly recognises Dr Morris Scantlebury as the 2024 Science & Technology Laureate.

From Biology to Animation: How Marsha Tull Found Her Creative Calling

Marsha Tull, a proud alumna of The UWI Cave Hill Campus, exemplifies the transformative power of pursuing one's passions. While her journey began with a Bachelor of Science in Biology in 2012, it has since taken an unexpected, yet inspiring turn into the world of animation, where she has carved out a dynamic career as a freelance Animation Supervisor.

Reflecting on her decision to study biology, Marsha recalls a natural gravitation toward the sciences during her secondary school years. Physics and biology were her strong suits, but she ultimately chose biology for its manageability as a first degree. "UWI gave me the opportunity to explore my academic interests and allowed me to discover my strengths and weaknesses," she shared.

Yet, despite completing her degree, Marsha found herself questioning her professional direction. "I didn't have a clear idea of where I wanted to go with biology," she admits. It was during this period of uncertainty that her creative side began to resurface. A serendipitous newspaper advertisement seeking digital artists marked the start of her foray into animation. After applying and being selected, Marsha trained in 2D Cut-out Animation, which laid the foundation for her eventual career.

Her early days in animation were met with both challenges and opportunities. The closure of the studio where she first trained could have been a setback, but Marsha and her colleagues, guided by their mentor A J Côte, persevered. "We worked



Despite the excitement of her profession, Marsha acknowledges the hurdles of working in animation, particularly in Barbados. "The demand for animated work locally is limited, so much of our projects come from international or regional clients," she explained. Managing the unpredictable workflow and maintaining a balance between quality output and personal well-being are constant priorities in her career.

Marsha's biology background continues to influence her work in subtle but meaningful ways. "Understanding natural behaviours and movements helps make animated scenes feel believable," she noted, highlighting the unique interplay between her scientific foundation and creative endeavours.

Her current affiliations with Trekvoy Art and Literary Endowment for the Naturally Talented (TALENT) and the Animated Arts Learning Institute (AALI) reflect her passion for empowering others in the creative industry. As Animation Supervisor for TALENT, she ensures the quality and timeliness of animated productions. At AALI, she mentors aspiring animators, helping them build polished portfolios to launch their careers.

Looking ahead, Marsha envisions the growth of a vibrant animation industry in Barbados. She is committed to developing a local intellectual property that reflects the island's unique culture and potential. "Animation can be so much more than entertainment - it has untapped potential for commercial and educational applications in Barbados," she remarked.


Advice for Aspiring Entrepreneurs

For Ms Pounder, her time at The UWI Cave
Hill was more than an academic experience - it was a defining period that shaped
her approach to leadership and professional
success. Reflecting on her undergraduate
years, she recalls the invaluable exposure to a
diverse, regional environment where she interacted with students from across the Caribbean.
This experience broadened her perspective and
prepared her for the realities of working in a sector
that serves people from various backgrounds.

Her natural inclination toward leadership became evident early on. "I kept finding myself in leadership roles - whether I wanted to or not!" she laughs. Group projects and university initiatives consistently placed her in positions where she guided teams, set direction, and ensured results. That innate leadership ability continued post-graduation, leading her into a career within the Credit Union movement.

Her professional journey began at the Barbados Public Workers' Co-operative Credit Union Ltd, a pivotal moment that reinforced the influence of her UWI experience. A serendipitous connection with her former lecturer, Dr Edward Corbin (now Akhentolove Corbin), then serving on the Board of Directors, further cemented her belief in the power of mentorship and academic networks. From there, she advanced through various leadership roles in marketing, strategic planning, governance, and operations - each step preparing her for her current leadership position.

Ms Pounder credits The UWI Cave Hill with providing not only a strong academic foundation but also invaluable lessons in adaptability, collaboration, and strategic thinking. "The Credit Union movement thrives on cooperation, and my UWI experience taught me how to navigate different perspectives, bring people together, and find solutions that work for everyone," she explains.

She also highlights the importance of working in diverse teams, a skill honed during her university years. "At UWI, you learn to communicate effectively and lead under different circumstances. You have to figure things out - whether it's managing competing priorities or working with people who have different approaches. That ability to adjust and deliver results has been critical in my career."

While Ms Pounder did not initially realise the historical significance of her appointment, she now recognises the impact of her achievement. "It was only when the question was posed to me that I realised the significance. Progress has been made in making space for women in leadership, but challenges remain," she notes.

She acknowledges the unique challenges that women face in balancing professional ambitions with personal responsibilities but remains optimistic about the evolving workplace landscape. More than anything, she sees her role as an opportunity to mentor and inspire other women in the movement. "Representation matters. Leadership isn't about gender - it's about competence, vision, and impact."

Ms Pounder describes her leadership approach as informal, yet purpose-driven. "People need to be inspired. Motivation is temporary, but when people have a vision they can get behind, they take ownership of their work in a way that's far more powerful than simply being told what to do."

She emphasises collaborative leadership, fostering an environment where open dialogue and shared decision-making are encouraged. "I'm fortunate to have a very experienced and competent team, so they don't need micromanagement. They need clarity, direction, and trust."

For young women, particularly UWI graduates aspiring to leadership roles in traditionally maledominated fields, Ms Pounder offers four key pieces of advice. First, do not be intimidated by gendered expectations. "Leadership is about competence, confidence, and execution. If you focus on being excellent at what you do, respect and recognition will follow." Second, develop your voice and presence. "Women often secondguess themselves in professional spaces, but you belong in the room just as much as anyone else." Third, be intentional about networking. "Building relationships isn't just about job opportunities - it's about learning, mentorship, and growth." Finally, stay adaptable. "The path to leadership isn't always linear, but every experience - good or bad adds to your toolkit. When opportunities arise, step up and grow into them."

Ms Tracia Pounder's appointment as the first female General Manager of the Barbados Co-operative Credit Union League is more than a personal achievement - it is a testament to the evolving landscape of leadership and the impact of a UWI education. Her journey exemplifies the power of resilience, adaptability, and strategic vision, making her a role model for future generations of UWI graduates.

As she continues to break barriers and inspire others, one thing is certain: Ms Pounder is not just leading an organisation - she is shaping the future of the Credit Union movement in Barbados and beyond.
